The adjourned case of Taylor vs. the Charlottetown Light and Power Co., which was heard before the city court some days ago, came up again yesterday morning before the city police court and was dismissed.

Miss Helen Hughes, of Charlottetown, the young lady graduate of Mt. Allison, who was so well received at the concert in the Old Kirk on Thursday evening, sang at both services at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church on Sunday.—Fredericton Gleaner.

At the police court in this city yesterday morning W. McCabe, drunk, was fined five dollars or twenty days. A case against Joseph Cameron, charged with breaking and entering a warehouse occupied by Owen Trainor and stealing therefrom a quantity of whiskey to the value of about three dollars, also came up and was adjourned until Saturday morning.

Dr. W.H. Pethick, city, leaves today for Pictou where he will join Commissioners Dryden and Ritch, and accompany them during their visit to Nova Scotia where they will be engaged in looking into the sheep raising possibilities in that Province. Professor Cumming of the Truro Agricultural College and Mr. Hubbard of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture will probably join the Commissioners at Truro.

George E. Robinson, M. A., Principal of the McGill University College, Vancouver, B.C., arrived in the city Tuesday evening accompanied by his sister Miss Jennie. They will remain here for several weeks, the guests of their uncle, James Shaw, Mt. Edward Road. Mr. Robinson is a native of Charlottetown, where he was at one time Vice-Principal in West Kent School and subsequently Supervisor of the city schools, and Professor of Mathematics in the Prince of Wales College. He is also well known in athletic circles, being at one time a very active member of the first Abegweit football team. He is now one of the most prominent educationalists on the Pacific Coast and the institution of which he is head in Vancouver is steadily growing and keeping pace with the growth of that city.

Before J. A. McDonald, Stipendiary Magistrate for Queen's County, the case against five parties for depositing manure or refuse in piles near Southport Station whereby public health was endangered, came up. It transpired that the piles complained of had been removed before the summons had been served and evidence presented by County and Provincial health officers showed that the piles were a menace to public health. After the taking of considerable evidence relative to the matter composing the heaps complained of and the manner in which they had been offensive fines were allotted as follows: Aubrey Mutch, \$4 and costs; A. Burke, J.N. Stewart, Rogers, Farquharson and George McDonald, \$1 and costs each. D. Edgar Shaw appeared for the defendants, Burke, Stewart and McDonald. Another case, that of Samuel Wood, census enumerator, vs. Patrick Corish, who had refused certain information in the taking of the census. This was settled between the parties at court, the defendant agreeing to answer the necessary questions.

A recitative air My Heart is Weary, by Miss Goodill closed the first part of the program. The second part of the program consisted of a piano solo, a reading and a duet and which were much appreciated. All the numbers of the program were encored and the young ladies very kindly responded to these encores. The concert was one of the best held in the city for a long time.

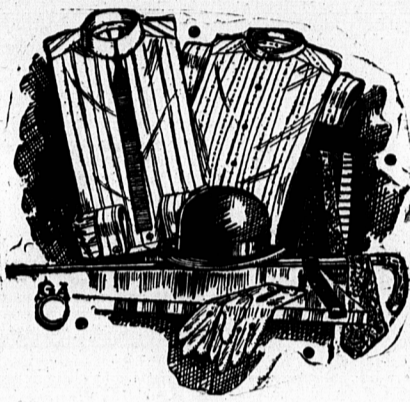

THE BREAD MERGER.

TORONTO, June 11—A company has been formed with a capital of five million to purchase a bakery in Montreal, one in Winnipeg and the Berlin, Tomlin, and Weston bakeries in Toronto with the object of centralizing the management, modernizing the plant and providing three cities with better bread at the same price. This is the outcome of the much talked of bread merger. The financier at the back of the project is Cawthor Muloch.

RUMOR THAT E. B. EDDY CO. TO SELL IS CURRENT.

HULL, June 13, 9 A fairly direct and apparently reliable rumor to the effect that the E. B. Eddy company will shortly be sold out to an English concern is abroad. Telegraph advices are that such rumor is also abroad in Montreal and Toronto. The rumor is rather indefinite, however, and the names of the British capitalists and exact number of millions they are supposed to have paid, is reserved. W. H. Rowley, president of the E. B. Eddy Co., said: "You may say that Mr. Rowley positively declines to discuss the rumor, particularly on the ground that the E. B. Eddy company is a private corporation and is under no direct obligations to the public."
