APPARENTLY the honeymoon season has not yet ended. At New Glasgow on Wednesday the marriage of Spurgeon Gamon of New Glasgow to Miss Ethel Stramborg of River John was celebrated, and the happy couple left on a wedding journey which is to include a trip to this Province and another newly married pair who will also visit this Island will be Roy A. Randall of Bayfield, N. B., and Miss Nora Pauline Eldred, of New Glasgow N. S., whose marriage took place on the 17th inst.

REV. MR. BATES, of Summerside, who has been holding a series of special services in the Coburg street Christian church, St. John N. B. received a very pleasant surprise this morning. It came in the form of a cheque for \$244.98, the proceeds of a collection taken at the convention of the Christian Church in Buffalo, N. Y., and is to be added to the building fund of the new church to replace the one destroyed in the recent fire at Summerside. The cheque was sent by A. McLean who lives in Cincinnati, and is president of the Foreign Christian Missionary Society, himself a former member of the church at Summerside, of which Mr. Bates is now pastor. The old building was worth about \$4,000 and insured for only \$1,000. Regarding conditions in Summerside, Mr. Bates is informed by private letters that 300 families are homeless and that a relief fund has been started. Touching the suggestions of the Charlottetown Guardian that St. John might properly repay the kindness of Summerside in 1877, Mr. Bates states that he is going to Summerside on Saturday and would gladly take to the mayor any relief funds that might be subscribed in St. John. He is the guest while here of Rev. Mr. Floyd, pastor of Coburg Street church.—St. John Times.

A NEW MAGAZINE—"WOMAN" The Sixth of the Frank A. Munsey Company's Publications.

The Frank A. Munsey Company has, with the addition of its newest magazine "WOMAN", increased the total number of its monthly publications to six. The oldest one of the six is The Argosy, which is now nearly twenty-four years old. The others are Munsey's, The All-Story, The Scrap Book and The Railroad Man's Magazine. The total circulation of these six magazines is over 2,000,000 copies and the amount of fiction issued by this one publishing house every thirty days, is said to weigh over five tons. "WOMAN" is a straight reading magazine, making up for its lack of illustrations by its wealth of stories, articles and departments. It was apparently built on the principle that a woman would rather read a good story than glance over a few pages of more or less interesting illustrations. The principle is undoubtedly a sound one, when the stories are as much worth reading as those in the November "WOMAN".
