visited you that we proposed asking the Charlottetown City Council for a yearly grant. In company with a representative of the management of the Charlottetown Hospital, we waited on the Council and put the matter very clearly before them. We were given a most courteous and sympathetic reception but have not yet received any information as to what they proposed doing. We were particular to point out that the grant, if given at all, must be quite in proportion with the free work which the Hospitals have been doing for the City for the last forty-five years.
Please remember that cities everywhere make grants for the upkeep of their Hospitals in addition to the large private subscriptions received but in Charlottetown these two Hospitals have been taking care of the sick poor of the city for forty-five years without a nickel of support. Today this free work averages about \$3000 a year by each Hospital for the city sick poor. It has only been possible for us to do this through the splendid assistance of our generous citizens. Your trustees would therefore ask each citizen to talk to their City Council and support our claim for a fair grant.
Our Endowment Fund has been increased during the year by \$2,209.89 and now stands at \$52,768.21. The additions are:

An extra effort has been made by the Trustees to get a large representation here tonight to discuss and decide the matter of building a new Hospital or remodeling the old one. What we are to do shall be decided tonight and we ask every one here to express their opinion fully and frankly. Your Trustees can only submit what in their opinion is best but we are glad to report that we are unanimous on one plan. The public, however, will have to find the money for what ever plan is to be followed and it is their privilege to decide here tonight what is to be done.
When five years ago we put on a campaign for \$70,000 with which to pay off our accumulated deficit of \$15,000 and the balance to be used in repairing and remodeling the old Hospital, we were frequently advised at that time to instead make the campaign for an amount large enough to build a new modern hospital. We believe now that we made a mistake in not doing so but at that time it was rather with fear and trembling that we asked for \$70,000.
We could not go ahead with that remodeling until at least the greater part of the campaign money had been paid in and when we were assured of most generous support we found the cost of remodeling would be of an amount far beyond the amount of money we could expect from the campaign fund. It might also be said here for your information that we were unable to go ahead on account of the uncertainty of the location of the Canadian National Railway's extension programme and it was not until nearly midsummer of

the past year. Mrs. Bentley and her officers have worked hard during the entire year and have given the most careful thought to the requirements of the Hospital.
We must speak too strongly of the splendid work done by Miss Howat, our Superintendent, and Miss Mair, our Superintendent, and Miss Harris, our Head Nurse. They have actually been doing the work of four people. As housekeeper and Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Harris has fulfilled her duties to the entire satisfaction of the board and our present splendid financial position is to quite an extent due to her efforts. Our fuel bill is again lower and this is to quite an extent due to the effort of Mr. Garlick, the engineer.
Again we wish to remind you of the pupil nurses. They put in three hard years. Give them a drive in the country when you have a spare seat or two in your car. They are a good lot and will appreciate it.
It is with very great regret we have to refer to the death of the late Dr. James Warburton for so many years a member of our medical staff and from which he will be greatly missed. A most kind gentleman, courteous always, a great practitioner, loved and missed by all.
We must again record our appreciation of the medical staff for their willing attention to the ward patients and for their assistance and advice in keeping our Hospital as well equipped as our means will permit.
As usual the sick and friendless have had the constant attention of the clergermen of the different denominations and to them we wish to express our appreciation of their services.
