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RICH TYRONE COAL HEIGHTENS ULSTER-FREE STATE CONFLICT

Northern Government Determined Not to Let Treaty Give Fields to Dublin- People of Area, However, Are Nationalists.

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OMAGH, County Tyrone, Northern Ireland, Jan. 27.—This interest of old town, the capital of County Tyrone, in the news of the north-Nationalist in all its sentiments. It is the electoral center of the combined parliamentary constituency of Fermanagh and Tyrone and so very important political center in the recent contests for seats in the House of Commons.

Mr. Healy, he it remembered, is an unchanged prisoner of the Northern Government. He has been held in durance for nearly two years and this is his second election to Parliament since he was imprisoned. But, as Richard Lovelace maintained, "Stone walls do not a prison make nor iron bars a cage."

From the Larne prison Mr. Healy has through his election agent sent this message to his constituents in Fermanagh and Tyrone: "The figures in the election returns are an indication of how unhappy the great majority of the people of that area feel at the restrictions placed upon their liberties during the last two years. In the newspapers I have read of strange happenings at Caledon, Cookstown, Lisbellin and other places. In the face of so many difficulties the electors have indicated a fine spirit."

"I wish I could convey my appreciation of the many sacrifices made by the dispossessed, particularly such long distances to record the old man's not only for Mr. Healy and myself, but as a protest against partition, and an expression of their desire to be included in the Free State."

"I sincerely trust there will not be an hour's unnecessary delay in putting Clause 12 (the Boundary Commission Clause) or the treaty into operation."

"With the gerrymandering of the areas, the imposition of objectionable oaths upon public officials, priests and teachers, the people long intensely for relief from a rule so much out of sympathy with their nationality and religion."

County Tyrone not only possesses a political and social interest, but it possesses an economic interest which may well make the fight a desperate one—when the show down is considered whether the area shall remain under the Northern Government or pass into the Free State. Out in the eastern part of the county, in the Lough Lurg area, are the shores of Lough Lurg, the only coalfields in Ireland that have yielded a product of good quality.

The opening of these fields has been undertaken by Sir Samuel Kelly, of Belfast, and it is expected that by spring 400 men will be at work underground. The promoters look forward to developments which will warrant the employment of 1000 men under ground with an additional 10 per cent at the surface. But—in whose territory, that of the Northern Government, or the Irish Free State, will this rich deposit be a year hence?

We announce today the death of Mr. J. Chadwick Stretch who passed away at his home at West River on the morning of Monday last.

The deceased was the eldest son of the late Mr. Joseph Stretch, who with his family came to this island from England in the year 1856 and has been a resident of the West River district for nearly seventy years.

A quiet, industrious, unassuming man of literary inclination, fond of reading and well-informed concerning all questions of current interest, the late Mr. Stretch enjoyed to a high degree the respect of the people of the neighborhood in which he lived. For upwards of thirty years he was a lay-reader licensed by the bishop of the diocese to conduct the services of the Church of England. Born and educated in the Mother Country his firmness in the faith of his forefathers was evidenced throughout his prolonged illness and in the hour of his departure.

He is survived by three brothers namely, Mr. Joseph Stretch now resident in the State of Oregon, U. S. A., Mr. William Stretch, Long Creek and Mr. Frederick Stretch on the homestead.

The funeral service in St. Thomas Church yesterday afternoon was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Rand now in charge of the Church of England at Crapadding. The procession from the home to the church was an exceptionally long one.

Mr. Rand in the course of an appropriate address paid eloquent tribute to the virtues of the deceased gentleman.

The pall-bearers at the funeral were Messrs. Thomas Henderson, Norman McLean, Theophilus Stuart, Malcolm Morrow, George Wilson and Neil McKenzie.
