PROBABLE MOVEMENTS OF GOV'T STEAMERS

Captain S. Bartlett, of Newfoundland, arrived in the city Wednesday and is at the Halifax. It was he who took the steamer Neptune from here to Hudson Bay with supplies two or three years ago, and it is reported he is to take the Government steamer Stanley, now doing Marine and Fisheries Department work in the vicinity of St. John, up Hudson Bay this year with a surveying party who will be landed there after the Stanley will return to Halifax. It is expected she will sail from here for the day about June 20th, and will return after landing the surveying party. It is also reported the Government has purchased at Newfoundland a schooner suitable for navigation in northern waters. She is about 100 tons register, and is expected shortly in Halifax, where she will have auxiliary power apparatus, steam or gasoline, installed, and be fitted up for a trip to Hudsons Bay. She will carry a party to survey the inlets of the Bay and rivers emptying into it. Capt. Gushie, of Newfoundland, is to command her. A further report is that the Government steamer Earl Grey is also to go to Hudsons Bay and that Captain Bartlett, on his return in the Stanley, will transfer to the Earl Grey and pilot her over the same waters as the Stanley. It has been reported for some time that the Governor General was going to cruise on the ice breaker this summer, and now it is believed His Excellency is going to see Hudson Bay for himself, taking along a small party with him. The ice breaker has sturgeon apartments on board for the Governor General, and when she was building, it was understood that he would use her in summer. All of which would seem to indicate there will be something doing at Hudson Bay this summer.—Halifax Chronicle.

BOSTON ORCHID SHOW BEAUTIFUL

BOSTON, May 23—The coolest and most beautiful flower garden probably ever seen in this country, was opened to the public tonight at Horticultural Hall in the first orchid exhibition in America by Massachusetts Horticultural Society. Plants and blossoms were shown from many countries of Europe and South America through arrangements blossoms valued at several thousand dollars apiece were on exhibition.

NEW YORK, May 26—Louis Gratch twenty-five years old, painter by day and burglar by night, was discovered by Mrs. Dora Gietsman in her apartment on the third floor of a Delaware street house today and, after beating the man with a cuspidor until he backed against a window with a low sill, was smashing him across the face with a rolling pin when he toppled to instant death on the concrete pavement fifty feet below.

ITALIAN FINED \$50

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., May 26—Antonio Rosso, a Toronto Italian, was fined fifty dollars by Magistrate Fraser today for assisting a brother alien, who had previously been refused admission, into Canada. The two brothers were apprehended in the empty coal crossing Michigan Central bridge and were up for transportation when detected by the immigration inspector for the former offence. Two other Toronto Italians are up on similar charges and will be tried on Monday.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLF CHAMPION NOW COACH OF ST. JOHN CLUB

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., May 26—J. T. Henderson, golf champion of the maritime provinces, has resigned as superintendent of streets and left for St. John yesterday, where he has accepted a position as instructor and caretaker of the St. John Golf Club. Mr. Henderson won the championship on the links at Halifax Golf Club last summer and recently received the championship medal.

TEN LABOR DISPUTES SETTLED IN APRIL

OTTAWA, May 26—During April there were sixteen labor disputes in existence in Canada, six more than in April of last year. About 122 firms and 3,704 employees were affected. The less of time to employees through trade disputes during the month was approximated at 49,110 working days, compared with 50,570 days in March. Ten of these disputes were settled. The employers were successful in two cases; the employees were successful in three, and compromises were effected in five.

BARTLETT TO TRY FOR SOUTH POLE

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 26—In speaking of his coming hunting trip to the Far North, Harry Whitney, of this city, who spent a year hunting in the polar regions, said last night that Captain Robert Bartlett, who commanded Peary's ship, the Roosevelt, and who will be in command of the Heclie, the ship which Whitney will use, will on his return from the trip make an expedition to the South Pole. Mr. Whitney would give no details further than that Captain Bartlett will himself try to reach the Pole.
