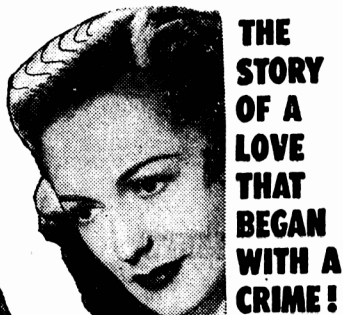

### VARIED ACTIVITIES OF THE WORLD W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Boole. The varied activities of the W. C. T. U. in the forty-six countries in which it functions, said Mrs. Boole, World President, range from the sponsoring homes for unwed mothers and their babies in Korea, to taking care of war refugees in Switzerland, Sweden and Denmark, while Frances Liu, executive secretary of the W. C. T. U. in China has continued her orphanages and homes for the aged during the war, though she has had to move several times.

Mrs. Liu in China, and she has held office also under the Chinese government. Other National Presidents are Mme. Goubiran, wife of Sen. Asir Goubiran, a member of the Egyptian Government, Mascar Kie daughter in Czechoslovakia, and Fatima Sharrofa Khamin Abad, daughter of the President of the Syrian Republic.


Mrs. Celeste Amstutz, Singapore, was President of the W. C. T. U. and National Vice-President of Malaysia of the Y. M. C. A. She was in Singapore with her husband, a missionary educator of the Methodist Church, when the Japanese attacked Malaya, and escaped with her children. Her husband chose to remain to serve the needs of thousands of Chinese, Malaysians and Indians connected with the church there and was interned for three and one-half years.
