Dean Holmes To Receive Honour

HALIFAX, N. S., April 21.—Dean Holmes of the Diocese of Fredericton will be the recipient of an honorary doctorate in divinity at the King's College convocation on May 5. President Dr. A. H. Moore announced in making his educational report to the Nova Scotia Synod of the Church of England.

President Moore reported a satisfactory financial condition for the year. The budget had been balanced and \$1,311.71 carried forward.

There had been an increase in attendance. Students studying for the ministry numbered 29. A K'nig's company of the Canadian officers training corps had been organized and the present termed it "a valuable, virile factor in college life."

Mabel Mason, M.A., formerly on the King's staff at Windsor, and since 1925 taking postgraduate courses, will return to the college next year as professor of modern languages. Dr. A. K. Griffin, who has had a year's leave of absence, becomes professor of classics.

UNEMPLOYED SHOULD WORK FOR SUSTENANCE

SYDNEY, N. S. W. April 21.—Whether unemployment relief should be allotted only in return for work is a question at present agitating the New South Wales government. A clause in the unemployment relief act provides that municipalities may demand that members of the unemployed should give work for sustenance.

Several ministers hold the view that the direction of parliament should be carried out, although the government and members of the Labor party are opposed to it because of the difficulty in allotting the work to the various classes of unemployed. While the point is being argued no new relief works are being authorized, and practically the whole of the funds are being absorbed in sustenance, without the government receiving any return for the outlay.

If the government persists in flouting the will of parliament, the opposition will take steps to demand that a portion of the money raised by special taxation should be devoted to the employment of men who are anxious to work for the relief they receive.

New Schooner For Grenfell Fleet

ESSEX, Mass., April 21.—There was a solemnity which does not usually attend the committing of a maiden vessel to the sea at the launching today of the little schooner Jessie Goldthwait. The woman, whose name she carried down the ways, died since her keel was laid and Arthur D. Story, her builder, the old man folks called the "twizard of Essex," died a few weeks ago, before his task was quite completed.

Dr. Joel E. Goldthwait, who bestowed upon the vessel his late wife's name, has given the craft to Sir Wilfred Grenfell for his medical work among the Labrador fishermen. He and Mrs. Goldthwait had planned the schooner as a yacht, but perhaps Dr. Goldthwait did not care to sail alone.

The schooner is 76 feet long and is powered with an auxiliary diesel motor. Sir Wilfred is expected soon to inspect the latest addition to his hospital fleet as he is due to arrive in this country within the next few days.

Insist On Halifax As Grain Port

HALIFAX, April 21.—"There is no question but that the Gibb report as filed is serious disappointment to everyone in the province," Premier G. S. Harrington said in the legislature last night, speaking on grain rates and the future of Halifax as a grain port.

"Just what can be done regarding the matter I don't know at the moment, but this government has left no stone unturned and I am certain that the authorities at Ottawa are fully aware of the responsibilities we have placed on them regarding the fixing of grain rates." The Federal Government had never exercised action in working out the details of fixing rates but the responsibility rested there and what could be done remained to be seen.

He thought the matter should not be referred back to the Railway Commission unless definite instructions from the government accompanied it, but that it might go to the committee investigating transportation problems.

If it would strengthen the provincial government's hand, A. S. MacMillan, Opposition leader suggested, a resolution would be passed without debate.

He had conferred with Senator W. H. Dennis, the Premier said, and Senator Dennis was going to urge that the matter of establishing Halifax as a grain port should not be regarded as closed, even on the opinion of so eminent an authority as Sir Alexander Gibb.

Statements Are Denied

WINNIPEG, April 18.—A small Canadian Press)—Statements made by Premier R. B. Bennett in the House of Commons yesterday with respect to negotiations that were carried on between himself and Premier John Bracken of Manitoba before closing of the Manitoba Provincial savings office were denied in the Legislature this afternoon by Mr. Bracken.

The Manitoba Premier denied he had stated to Mr. Bennett that he had decided to close the savings office and was seeking only to find a way to protect the depositors, as intimated in Premier Bennett's statement.

"With all due deference to the Prime Minister," Mr. Bracken said, "I must respectfully disagree with his statements. I cannot understand how Mr. Bennett could have gathered the impression from our interviews that we had concluded to close the offices."

Notice To Lobster Fishermen

Lobster Fishermen are allowed to set out their fishing gear on Saturday, April 30th. No one shall leave the shore for the fishing grounds before six o'clock in the morning of such day. A heavy penalty will be imposed on anyone violating the regulations in this respect.

Resolutions Re St. Lawrence Waterways

ST. JOHN, N. B., April 21.—(By The Canadian Press)—St. Lawrence Waterways negotiations by the Dominion Government without previous consultation with all Canadian provinces and Great Britain were in direct violation of the letter and spirit of the British North America Act, says a resolution passed by the St. John Board of Trade.

The government of New Brunswick was requested to oppose "with the constitutional means at disposal any further tie-up between the United States and Canada in connection with the St. Lawrence Waterways."

"The resolution, questioning the authority of the Dominion Government to effect treaties with foreign countries, read as follows: "Whereas, in our opinion, the Federal executive government and parliament were not vested under the British North America Act with authority to effect treaties with foreign countries, this authority having been retained by the Imperial government for the protection of the provinces which constitute this confederation, as well as for protection of Imperial interests; and "Whereas, for some time, the Federal executive government, apparently had deemed it expedient to arrange certain treaties and trade agreements with other countries, such treaties and agreements not requiring joint financial outlay and joint undertaking, and being for a term of years and subject to cancellation and "Whereas, the proposed St. Lawrence treaty is reported to require heavy joint financial expenditures and involve joint undertakings, is of interest to all the provinces, far reaching in its character; and, "Whereas, we feel that such treaty is inexpedient and that it will not promote peace, order and good government for the Federal executive government to carry through the negotiations for such treaty—even were it desirable—and that a treaty of such nature and character should be arranged only by His Excellency the Governor-General-in-Council in conjunction with the governments of all the provinces and with the approval of the Imperial government, thus promoting Federal and Imperial unity; and,

"Whereas, the development of 'The American St. Lawrence trade route by the Federal government is, in our opinion, a direct violation of the letter and spirit of the treaty of union of the British North America provinces as expressed in section 66 of the London agreement and confirmed by statements by members of the government of the province of Canada in the debates in the Canadian legislature. 1865, and elsewhere;

"Therefore resolved that the St. John Board of Trade respectfully request the government of the province of New Brunswick to protest to His Excellency, the Governor-General-in-Council, against the Federal executive government carrying on negotiations with respect to the proposed treaty without consulting the governments of all the provinces of Great Britain and also that the government and legislative assembly of New Brunswick be respectfully requested to oppose with the constitutional means at disposal any further tie-up between the United States and Canada in connection with the St. Lawrence Waterways.

"Further resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to His Excellency, the Governor General, and to the Premier of Canada, the leader of His Majesty's loyal opposition; his Hon. the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, to the Premier thereof, the leader of the opposition, and to the local members in the legislature."

Appointment

OTTAWA, April 21.—(By The Canadian Press)—The appointment of Dr. Douglas Washburn Gray to be a member of the Board of Pensions Commissioners for Canada was announced today by Hon. Murray MacLaren, Minister of Pensions and National Health. Dr. Gray fills the vacancy caused by the retirement at the completion of his term of Dr. J. F. McQuay.

Ship's Surgeon Dies On Trip

MONTREAL, April 21.—(By the Canadian Press)—Dr. Alexander Girvan, surgeon of the Canadian Pacific liner Duchess of York, died on board the vessel while enroute from New York to Montreal, it was announced when the vessel docked here today.

Cause of death was intestinal haemorrhage, it was announced. He was born in Scotland in 1871 and entered the Canadian Pacific Service in 1922 on the Minnedosa, subsequently serving on the Montclair, Montrose, Marloch, Montcalm, Duchess of Bedford, Duchess of Richmond and Duchess of York. He served in the Royal Army Medical Corps in Mesopotamia during the war, being awarded the Military Cross. The funeral will take place here today.

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Papers Merge

CORNWALL, Ont., April 21.—Announcement is made here today of the purchase of the Cornwall Standard by the Cornwall Freeholder. The two papers will be amalgamated and known as the Standard-Freeholder published semi-weekly with the first issue April 30. The purchase follows the recent death of the pioneer publisher W. Gibbons, who for 44 years conducted the Standard. The Standard-Freeholder will be under the management of C. J. McTavish and will be identified in ownership with the Owen Sound Sun-Times. The Freeholder was established in 1848 and the Standard in 1886.
