LONDON, Jan. 14 — (Reuters) — Seven hundred tons of food given by Commonwealth countries to Princess Elizabeth on the occasion of her marriage now is being unpacked and re-packed for distribution to needy groups. The work is being done in the kitchens of Buckingham Palace by 80 volunteers from the Women's Voluntary Service organization. In two days they unpacked and repacked the first 100 tons which will go to war widows with young children. The second 100 tons will go to old age pensioners.
