

Western Women Want Social Security Plan

OTTAWA, June 2 (CP) — A couple of smiling women from the West are here to urge Prime Minister Mackenzie King to introduce a "contributory social security plan," as his final offering to Canada before retiring from office.

Mrs. Jean McDonald of Calgary, president of the three-year-old National Social Security Association, is head of a delegation which arrived in the Capital complete with brief and high hopes of obtaining an interview with Mr. King.

The women already have made the rounds of parliamentary members, and succeeded in seeing Welfare Minister Martin.

Mrs. McDonald said that at present the position of many older married women in Canada was "pathetic."

"You marry a man who's contributing to a pension fund—but when he retires that pension is not enough for him and his wife to live on," she said.

She added that in Calgary there "must be 500 or 600 cases" where the man was drawing a \$37-a-month old age pension—all the income for he and his wife.

The two others making up the four-woman delegation are Mrs. Ethel Thomson of Medicine Hat, Alta., and Mrs. Lillian Clarke, Calgary.

Noting that "half of the workers of Canada are in receipt of an annual income of \$950 or less," the brief states that "it is obviously difficult for persons in these wage groups to maintain a reasonable standard of living; it is utterly impossible for them to save for their old age."

Try Wheat Straw For Newsprint

THOROLD, Ont., June 2 (CP) — Newsprint made in part from wheat straw—instead of wood pulp—has been produced in quantity at the Ontario Paper Company Ltd. plant here, it was announced today.

The announcement, in a prepar-

ed statement, said 50 tons was manufactured—"first commercial tonnage in North America" of such newsprint.

The production is an outcome of the straw-pulping technique developed at the Pretoria, Ill. laboratory of the United States Agriculture Department.
