Rev. C. K. Hudson of Vernon River will preach on Sabbath next in the Methodist Church North Wiltshire in the morning; at Kingston, in the afternoon; and Cornwall in the evening.

William Happenny, the well known steamer pilot, a native of this City but now residing in Montreal has started training for the olympic games with Frank Lukeman whose name is also familiar to many in this Province as a short distance runner. Happenny is to go to Toronto at once to train.

Mr. Deguid, the British expert employed by the dominion government for the building of the ice breakers is now making trips between Georgetown and Pictou on the winter steamers Minto and Stanley to observe the ice conditions. Mr. Deguid is completing his designs for the new ice breaking steamer for communication between the Island and the mainland.

At the City Police Court the case against six young men for disturbing a concert and basket social at Winsloe Hall on Feb. 12th was up and resulted in G. H. Ford and J. H. Diamond of Winsloe being fined \$5 and costs. They paid the fine; D. Ford, Ebenezer, and B. McCallum Brackley Point Road, were fined \$2 and costs and gave notice of appeal. The charge in the case of James McLaughlan and W. F. Ford was dismissed.

In the House of Commons, Ottawa, a few days ago Sir Frederick Borden expressed his sympathy with the work of Dominion Rifle association. He said he was glad to say that with a few trifling exceptions, he had received the full support of parliament regardless of party in any undertaking for the benefit of the Canadian militia. There was no politics in the militia. He referred to the step taken by Australia to compel all young men under the age of 25 years to give a certain number of days each year to drill. He did not think such a step would be taken in Canada. He had taken steps, however, to have training in all the schools of Canada for girls and boys. With the boys it would include military drill and rifle shooting. He had arranged a concrete plan with the Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick governments. He thought the D.R.A. was a little at fault itself for not receiving more contributions from the kings of industry and commerce. The wealthy men should be shown how important the militia force of Canada is to them and they should contribute to make it efficient. He spoke of the increase of cadet corps in Canada. He was glad that he would do all in his power to have them installed. He endorsed the movement to preserve the battle fields at Quebec, and hoped the people would support it and make it a great success.
