MONTREAL, Jan 30.—Fresh eggs prices continued their advance on the Montreal produce and dairy market today.

For the third consecutive day, prices gained a cent a dozen. The reasonable weather and a good demand gave strength to the market. Fresh extras in cartons or less were quoted at 20 cents, firsts at 19 cents and seconds at 18 cents a dozen.

Current receipts of Ontario cheese held unchanged at 9 cents for white, 10 cents for colored and 10 1/2 to 11 1/4 cents a pound for early season. Receipts were 11 boxes.

Carrots of less than 1 1/2 inch diameter remained firm. New Brunswick green mountains per 80 pound bag being quoted at 80 cents, Prince Edward Island green mountains per 80 pound bag at 80 cents and Prince Edward Island green mountains per 90 pound bag at 85 cents.

Packer buyers were slow in starting and there was a weak undertone, bulls brought \$1.30 to \$3. MONTHLY MEETING OF I.O.D.E. The regular monthly meeting of the I. O. D. E. was held in rooms of chapter in Legion building, Regent, Mrs. J. A. Mathieson presiding and large number present in spite of inclement weather conditions. After reports of officers had been dealt with, special Christmas work was reviewed. Letters were read from sick and absent members who expressed themselves pleased to be remembered at this season, special mention being made of Mrs. Holroyd, Mrs. Percy Pope, Miss Winnie MacLeod, Mrs. Bruce Muir, Mrs. S. C. Moore, Mrs. H. J. Palmer and Mrs. Miles. Many members absent from the province enclosed contributions for chapter work. The treasurer's report was, as usual, business-like, comprehensive and satisfactory. All bills were ordered paid and plans discussed as to how to make more money if activities were not to be curtailed. Finally decided on a bridge to be held next week, first in a series, this one to be in charge of Mrs. J. A. Mathieson, Mrs. J. D. Stewart and Mrs. A. E. Morrison.

Correspondence included interesting letter from Mr. Bramwell Chandler, I. O. D. E. overseas scholar from Prince Edward Island, for current year, acknowledging with gratitude the grant of a second term, and a letter from Miss Clark, bursary holder attending Dalhousie, acknowledging substantial Christmas remembrance from chapter. There were many grateful letters also from families of returned men throughout the province, whose children had been remembered at Christmas time with books, toys, groceries, etc. These parcels had been made very generous this year through the cooperation of chapter members; in previous years parcels had been made up largely from toys, etc., bought with funds donated by chapter. Naturally the need for something more practical presented itself for this year, and when donations were called for the response was most generous—into every family's parcel went a remembrance for every member of the family, besides a large Christmas pudding, groceries, reading matter, etc.

Members who had represented chapter at different school closings when I. O. D. E. prizes were presented, spoke of apparent pleasure with which this evidence of interest was received by principals and teachers in public schools. This being last meeting before annual meeting in February, nomination of officers for 1933 ensued after which meeting closed in regular order.

My sole purpose, however, in speaking is to endeavor to save it before it is too late. Rotarian C. H. Chandler was in the chair yesterday. Rotarian Dr. Johnson referred to the annual meeting of the Red Cross Society which is to be held in the City Building on Tuesday evening. The chief speaker will be Norman Sommerville, K. C., one of the leading barristers of the Dominion and a Past President of the Toronto Rotary Club. President Boulter stated that Rotarian Robertson, who had been ill, is considerably better and now able to see his friends; that Mrs. Pickard, wife of Rotarian Alfred Pickard, is slowly improving; but that Mrs. Mould, wife of Rotarian A. H. Mould, and Miss Lillian Earle, pianist of the Rotary Club, are still confined to their homes on account of illness.

It is blind folly to assume that when the crisis arises and we can get no more money from the banks, the Dominion Government and Parliament will come to the rescue. The Dominion a few years ago gave an addition of \$165,000 to our revenues. Our public men say this was on account. The other party to the transaction, however, doesn't admit that. The Island will most likely be told that as it has failed to show efficiency and prudence in managing its business, it should get under the wing of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick or of both.

As things are now, I would recommend a Maritime union rather than be forced into it later on disadvantageous terms. I would begin negotiations while conditions are favorable. By doing so, we would most likely secure the Maritime capital for our city, as well as other advantages for the province. In a forced union, a hard bargain can only be expected. After all, there will be some advantages in Maritime union. As an instance, the whole judicial systems of the provinces will be changed. Very large sums will be saved by the elimination of a large number of unnecessary judges and other officials, and the money saved thereby will be available for other and better purposes.

It is recognized in this province by all disinterested persons competent to give an opinion that three well qualified judges could easily deal with all our judicial business in place of the seven judges who now are doing their best to handle it. No doubt similar reductions could be made in the other provinces. The whole administration of justice would be improved, strengthened, speeded up. There would be a Maritime Appeal Court sitting at, say, Sackville with judges of high legal attainments, dissociated from all local influences and prejudices, to whom suits could bring their appeals with the greatest confidence. I will doubtless be charged with decrying the credit of the province.

It is useless to compare our per capita debt with those of other provinces. The trouble is our debt has very largely been incurred, not for capital, but for ordinary expenditure. The system of borrowing of the banks at high rates of interest to place in the sinking funds, instead of obtaining these funds from the
