Rev. J. S. Bonnell Speaks At Rotary

The Art of Public Speaking was the subject of an admirable address given by Rev. J. S. Bonnell at the speaker at yesterday's Rotary Luncheon.

Oratory is the finest form of self expression," said the speaker at the beginning of his address, and the man who can express himself clearly and forcibly in public can become a leader in his community.

Such great orators as Daniel O'Connell, Daniel Webster, John Bright, George Whitfield and Wendell Phillips, who swayed the emotions and passions of men as a great artist plays upon an instrument, rose to fame through their advocacy of a great cause.

Rotarian Bonnell taking up the technical side of public speaking presented the following suggestions to all who desire to express themselves fluently and effectively:

- (1) Speak in a conversational tone, no matter how large the audience is. Don't shout or bellow. A good rule is, "Go slow, rise higher take fire."
- (2) Don't make a speech unless you are well prepared. Demosthenes the greatest orator of all time was always well prepared.
- (3) Don't be afraid to turn down invitations to speak.
- (4) Don't apologize at the beginning of your speech.
- (5) Don't speak unless you have something to say.
- (6) Be brief. The average speaker should never take more than ten or twelve minutes.
- (7) Never impose a speech on a weary audience.
- (8) Be simple in your language.
- (9) Don't wave your arms or use high sounding words.
- (10) Carefully prepare your opening and closing, especially the latter.
- (11) Read the best masters in literature and oratory.
- (12) A beginner should first write notes of his proposed speech, then rehearse it, at least twenty times by himself.

Among the speeches specially recommended by Mr. Bonnell for study were those of John Bright (a great favorite with Lloyd George) and Wendell Phillips.

Hard, unrelenting work is the chief secret of success as an orator.

The hearty thanks of the Club was tendered the speaker of the day by the chairman, Rotarian C. L. Milne.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—Eggs firm unchanged. Egg trade throughout Canada reports from Toronto indicate that a price advance is probable during the next week. The general train of thought in Montreal is that there will be little change in the situation during the coming week. Cold storage reports from Washington, D. C., state that the holdings of eggs on August 1st were 10,020,000 cases as compared with 9,475,000 cases on July 1st and 9th, 246,000 cases on August 1st, 1924. Toronto market is firm and unchanged. Jobbing specials 42, extras 40, firsts 37, seconds 33.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.—The egg market is slightly easier with heavier receipts; dealers paying extra 24 1/2 firsts 32, seconds 27 1/2. Cob. Ontario points. The poultry market is cleaning up closely and the outlook is favourable, Manitoba and Saskatchewan markets remain unchanged. Winnipeg paying delivered extras 32, firsts 30, seconds 27. Calgary dealers paying country points delivered extras 32, firsts 28, seconds 24. Vancouver market remains steady and unchanged, jobbing extras 41 to 42, firsts 38 to 40, seconds and pullets 35.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was dull and featureless, there was little demand from any source, prices were well maintained for oats under a fair demand. The demand from the United States for winter wheat flour was the largest experienced here for some time and a considerable amount of business was transacted at fair prices. The spring wheat flour market continued steady with a fair business passing. The foreign demand for all lines of mill-feed continued good and a fair trade was transacted, prices were unchanged. Exporting grading in butter was again brisk and the local trade was also improved, prices were steady the egg and butter markets were inactive.
