YOUR POTATO CROP Will be Increased and QUALITY IMPROVED by Spraying with BORDEAUX MIXTURE

AMONG THE HORSES

A Game of Chance, the Fredericton speed purveyor, made an effort to lower the record of the Van Buren track the second day of the meeting. He negotiated the mile in 2:15 1/4.

There will be races at St. Stephen, N. B., Sept. 22 to 25, in connection with the exhibition.

The last heard of Frank Patch, the Halifax-owned Grand circuit performer of last season, he had been disposed of by lottery. Perhaps he is being saved for the fall races.

Three Grand Circuit drivers, A. H. Rodney, John Fleming and Mart Wilson, were suspended at Cleveland on Friday of last week. The suspensions range from six to thirty days.

Two world's records went by the boards at Cleveland in the free-for-all pace of the last day of the North Randall Grand Circuit races, in which Single G. created a sensation, after Russel Boy had won the opening heat, in 2:00 1/4, by nosing out Murphy's pacer in the second heat, duplicating the time of the first mile and then taking the race by tramping the third heat in 2:01 1/4.

Walter Cox won the free-for-all on the opening day of the Grand Circuit meeting at Detroit with Director Todd, the best time in the event being 2:06 1/4. Canute won the 2:17 pace the same day in 2:07 1/4, the field being so large that the class had to be split up into two sections. The 2:18 trot went to Zombro Clay in 2:08 1/4. The feature event of the second day, the Chamber of Commerce stake for a purse of \$5000, was won by Miss Harris M., a daughter of Peter the Great, in 2:01 1/4, taking the first two heats and dropping the third to Lindsay Gosnell who finished 100 for not driving out the third heat, with Single G. Grand Chimes won the 2:15 trot for a purse of \$3000 in 2:08 1/4, and Box R., captured the 2:10 pace worth \$2000 in 2:05 1/4. The 2:06 trot on the closing day was won by Joan in 2:06 1/4. Leila Patchen won the 2:05 pace in 2:05.

The maritime circuit had an auspicious opening at Moncton last week. The meeting opened on Friday and was continued on Saturday. The attendance was large on both days. Orwell Belle, the 2:10 entry, was the star performer of the meeting, capturing two races, the 2:15 trot on Friday and the 2:21 trot and pace on Saturday. The latter class consumed five heats, the Montague mare taking the first, second and fifth, the third and fourth going to Major Wellington, a local entry. The best time was 2:10, made in the first heat. Orwell Belle took the 2:21 class in three straight heats, her best time being 2:79. Bob Mac, the Islandbred racer now owned in Sydney, won the free-for-all, in straight heats, his best time being 2:14 1/2. The 2:25 class went to Len Acker's Little Smoke in 2:18 1/4. The races were all keenly contested and thoroughly enjoyed.

Orwell Belle, which began the racing season with a mark of 2:23 1/4, is now reeling off miles in 2:19. The mare has certainly improved wonderfully since becoming a member of the Ellis stable.

On the closing day of the Detroit meeting Patrina started to beat 2:15 trotting and negotiated the mile in 2:13 1/4. F. W. Carr went a mile in 2:20 in the effort to beat 2:30 trotting.

Fox and Pottle drove winners on the opening day of the meeting at Northampton, Mass. The former won the 2:24 trot with Miss Elmarch and the latter the 2:10 pace with Lady Gamage. Fox also had a winner the second day when Andy Ashland got away with the 2:15 pace. Andy established a new track record of 2:10 1/4 in the first heat, took the second in 2:11 1/4 and the third in 2:11 1/4. The three fastest heats ever paced by a horse in this class in New England on a half mile track. The same day Harry J. S. established a new track record in the race for 2:12 trotters in the second heat with a mark of 2:13 1/4, beating a record of 2:14 1/4 made by Zambro Rex earlier in the day.

Mabel Trask, owned and driven by Walter Cox, had little trouble in annexing the historic Merchants and Manufacturers \$10,000 stake for 2:08 trotters at the Detroit meeting on Wednesday of last week. Mabel Trask is a five-year-old chestnut mare by Peter the Great, sire also of the Chamber of Commerce winner, Miss Harris M., 2:01 1/4. She is owned by Bartley A. Pardee, of Atlantic City.

Provincial horses made a great killing on the opening day of the meeting at Van Buren, Me., Pat Doherty, the Sydney sportsman, who drives his own horses, won two of the races with Dan Payne and Pearl Bourbon, the latter being his latest acquisition from Indiana, and Roy Volo, a Fredericton entry, sprung a regular come-back and won his race. There were three classes on the programme, and all provided good sport. Dan Payne won the 2:17 class in 2:18 1/4, and Pearl Bourbon the 2:23 class in 2:19 1/4, this being the first win race record for the Doherty mare. Roy Volo's come back was staged in the 2:40 class, the chestnut pacer being driven by his owner, W. B. Lint, and winning in straight heats his best time being 2:21 1/4. Roy showed none of the effects of his recent illness at Houlton and looked to be as good as ever. The following day Alverton Bay, another member of the Doherty stable, copied third money in the 2:15 class, while Shrub, another of his string, finished fourth in the 2:23 class.

Single G., both missed the charmed two-minute list by only a quarter of a second. The Sassy, chased by Miss Harris M., paced in 2:03 1/4; St. Frisco trotted in 2:04 1/4; Mabel Trask Tramp-right, Grand Chimes, Azora, Axworthy and Busy's Lasale tramped miles better than 2:07, and the 2-year-old Mary Coburn trotted in 2:10 1/4.

The Grand circuit horses are at Kalamazoo this week. The opening day was featured by two brilliant victories for the stable of Walter Cox. He piloted Director Todd to victory in the 2:09 trot, and then captured the \$2000 Rickman hotel purse for 2:12 trotters with Worthy Prince. The 2:09 trot went the limit and the best time was 2:07 1/4. Worthy Prince won his race in 2:06 1/4.

It is said that \$200,000 was bet on the horses at the Detroit meeting. Some money, eh?

Miss Harris M., in taking the first two heats of the Chamber of Commerce stake at Detroit in 2:01 1/4 and 2:01 1/4, established a new world's record for the fastest two heats ever paced by a four year old mare.

Single G., not only gave a marvelous exhibition of speed in the Detroit free-for-all, pacing in 2:00 1/4, with the last half in 58 seconds, but he showed great gameness in the second heat. He limped badly after the first, and it was doubtful if he would start for the sixth heat. It is believed that he stepped on a small stone, bruising his foot. He came to the post with a decided nod, and when it was known he would surely start there was a rush to play Russel Boy in the mutuels. Scoring down, the stout-hearted Highlander forgot his lameness and at the word took the track to himself. Gosnell did not hurry him and was at the post in 1:04 1/4 and finished the mile in 2:03 1/4.

The first week of the Grand Circuit was marked by sensational racing, fulfilling the promise of the training season. Two pacers, Russel Boy and
