LAST TRIP TODAY—The S. S. Hochelaga which runs today between Pictou and Charlottetown is making its last trip today with a general cargo of potatoes for Halifax. ISLAND FURS FOR QUEEN?—The possibility of presenting Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth with a silver fox cape from Prince Edward Island when she visits Canada next summer will be taken up with the Provincial Government, it has been decided. Action by the Charlottetown Board of Trade will follow a suggestion made by Mr. J. O. Hyndman at the quarterly meeting of the Board last Friday night.
