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Chicago Cubs Take Over Third Place In The National League

Chicago Cubs dumped Boston Braves twice in a mid-week doubleheader at Boston to take over third place in the National League standings, gaining ground on the leaders New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers who both hit the canvas.

Cubs, bouncing back after two straight defeats at the hands of the Beantowners, came through with 4-0 and 5-2 wins yesterday. Pittsburgh dumped New York 8-7 and Cincinnati Reds edged Dodgers 5-4.

Philadelphia Phillies scored all their runs in the first inning to stave off St. Louis 5-4 and send the Cards back to the cellar after one day in slightly higher brackets.

Pirates and Cards now are tied at the bottom of the ladder. The Buccaneers halted New York's four-game winning streak with an early lead, but had to fight off another typical last-ditch rally by the Giants, trailing 8-4 going into the seventh, the Ottomans got two back and then in the final frame Willard Marshall clouted his 11th homer of the year—and second of the game—to send Polo Ground hopes soaring. But Kirby Higbe knuckled down and halted the rally.

At Brooklyn, Lefty Joe Hatten failed again to stop Reds, his first team, and Ray Mueller's pinch double with the bases loaded in the sixth gave them the decision. Hatten, the first of three Brooklyn twirlers, was charged with his third loss.

Right-hander Doyle Lade held Boston to seven hits in the opener in the Hub, as Lefty Warren Spahn, lost his second game again, nine victories. Starter Bob Chipman got the nod in the nightcap, although he had to leave the game in the eighth inning with a blistered finger. Braves got all their runs in that game as they bunched four hits off Chipman and Emil Kush.

Edmund relief twirling by Tommy Hughes and Schoolboy Rowe, plus a five-run attack off Howie Feltz in the first frame, was

good enough for the Philadelphia home crowd although Cards had collected three in the top half, and another in the third.

Del Rice, Cards' catcher, and outfielder Del Ennis and pitcher Fred Schmidt of Phils were injured in the game. Rice hurt his shoulder in an upset at the plate, and the others suffered leg injuries.

Lamoureux Of Canadiens Is Transferred

MONTREAL, June 11—(CP)—Camil Des Roches, publicity director for Montreal Canadiens, announced today that the contract of defenceman Leo Lamoureux has been transferred to Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League for next season.

Des Roches said Lamoureux, interested in a coaching job, will play defence for Buffalo and may help with coaching duties or possibly, later in the season, go to Houston, Texas, to coach the Houston team in the United States Hockey League.

The veteran defenceman, now 30, played in 50 games for Canadiens last season, scored two goals and assisted on 11 others. He will be replaced at the beginning of next season.

Des Roches also announced that Frank Selke, Canadiens' general manager, was in the United States last week and renewed Canadiens' working agreement with Buffalo and drafted an agreement with Dallas, Texas, of the U.S.H.L. which will be submitted to Canadiens' board of directors for approval.

Chicago White Sox broke rookie Frank Shea's seven-game winning streak yesterday as they downed New York Yankees 3-2 in an 11-inning thriller at Comiskey Park.

New York's defeat lost them a chance to tie Detroit for the American League lead, as the Belgians split a doubleheader with the rejuvenated Philadelphia Athletics.

Rookie Carl Scheib, making his first major league start, blanked Detroit 4-0 on seven hits in the nightcap after Tigers had taken the opener 7-1 on Al Benton's seven-hit job. The split raised Detroit's lead to a full game over the Yankees.

Boston Red Sox whitewashed Cleveland Indians 3-0 as manager Joe Cronin used two of his top-flight hurlers, Mickey Harris and Dave Ferriss against Red Embree and Bobby Feller, who came in for the eighth inning and was touched for a pair of runs in the ninth. Embree gave up the losing run in the second inning. Harris, the winner, held Indians to four hits until he was lifted for a pinch hitter in the eighth.

Washington dumped St. Louis Browns back into the cellar last night with a 4-2 victory behind the six-hit pitching of Early Wynn. Wait Juchnik hit his eighth home run of the year with no one on base.
