TWO MINUTE INTERVIEW.—Rev. Dr. Gauthier, of Palmer Road, was in town yesterday and crossed on the Northumberland morning. In a two-minute interview with a Guardian representative the Dr. stated that in his part of the province the season has been very good. Crops of hay, oats, potatoes and turnips have been excellent. The butter factory at St. Louis has had a very big season. There is very little difficulty in getting a ready sale for all the butter. The butter market for Prince Edward Island is very largely confined to the Maritime Provinces and of late the island has been producing a good deal more butter and less cheese, so that while the price of cheese has been high, butter has declined in price. In his section of the country the farmers co-operate in the selling of their lambs, and a few days ago, Messrs. Davis & Fraser, Charlottetown, purchased over one thousand lambs at 7-8 cents per lb. They are arranging to sell their pork co-operatively, but are not ready to do so this year. Dr. Gauthier speaks very enthusiastically about agriculture in the West of the island.

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society was held in the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock, the following members being present:—Judge Haszard, President; Mr. Percy Pope, Treasurer; Mr. E. C. Nash, Dr. Warburton, Mr. Schurman, Mrs. Rogers, Miss Pope, Miss McCready, Mrs. S. R. Jenkins, Mrs. Mathieson, Mrs. Bullman and Mrs. Alley.

The minutes of the last annual meeting having been read and passed, the Secretary's report was presented and adopted, as well as the report of the Treasurer, which shows the amount collected to date to be \$6,193.29. The sum of \$6,000 has been forwarded to the Canadian Red Cross Society (Toronto); and the expense being \$12.10, there thus remains on hand a balance of 181.19. Since the writing of this report contributions amounting to \$18.50 have been received from New Haven. On motion the Treasurer's report was adopted.

The following is a list of the goods sent to the Red Cross depot at Montreal:—

- Sheets, 524; pillow slips, 1550; towels, 211; handkerchiefs, 1000; pyjamas, 100; abdominal belts, 208; hot water bottle covers, 152; bed jackets, 129; bath robes, 27; night-shirts, 591; woollen shirts, 440; undershirts, 49; drawers, 49; blankets, 5; Nightgales, 73; bandages, all kinds, 3,000; men's socks, pairs, 150; wrist-lets, pairs, 316; Balacava caps, 99; pneumonia jackets, 68; bed socks, 214; men's mittens, 50 pairs; house-wife, 19.

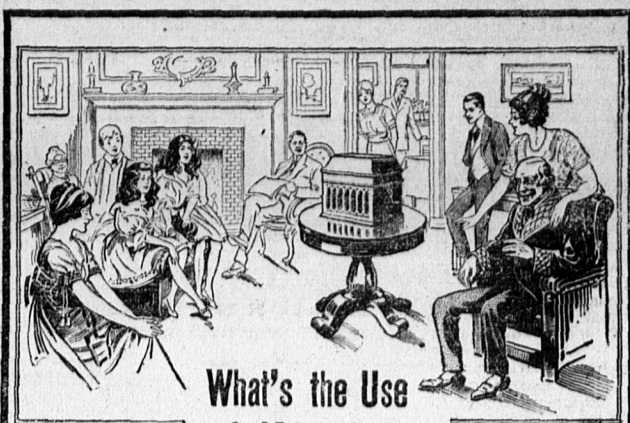
The following goods were also received; they were not sent as they were not required and were therefore given to the Belgian Relief Committee:—213 pillows, 7 quilts, 66 blankets. These goods are up to November 1.

Following goods are on hand up to November 1:—Shirts, 41; pillow slips, 47; towels, 60; handkerchiefs, 241; suits pyjamas, 9; bed jackets, 8; night-shirts, 50; woollen shirts, 22; Nightgales, 3; bandages, 1180; men's socks, 202; wristlets, pairs, 100; Balacava caps, 21; bed socks, 17 pairs; men's mittens, 34 pairs.

The following votes of thanks were passed: To the Board of Trade, for free use of the room; to Mr. David Schurman, for services rendered the Society; and to Mr. Percy Pope. It was announced with regret that Mr. Pope, owing to circumstances which compelled his absence from the province, was obliged for the present to resign his position as Treasurer.

The following officers were elected:—President, Judge Haszard; Vice-President, Mr. F. R. Heertz; Treasurer, Mr. Daniel McKinnon of the Dominion Savings Bank; Secretary, Mr. S. R. Brown, Lieut.-Colonel Davison, and Dr. Conroy.

Mr. Robert F. Tomlin was appointed to take the place of Mr. Schurman as receiver of goods.

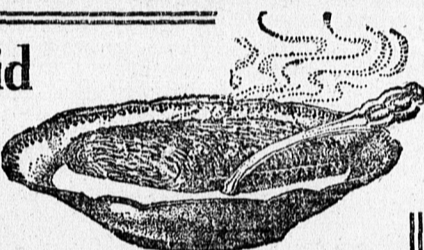

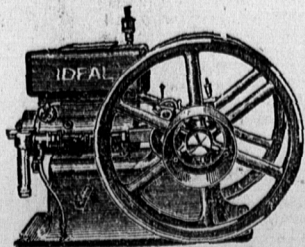
