THE sad death occurred at McNally's Island on Saturday forenoon of James H. Mitchell, member of the League of the Cross, and one of the company camping at the Island, about 10 miles from the city. Young Mitchell, was about 19 years of age. He was in apparent good health and was sitting on a chair where he had been playing on a musical instrument and laughing with the other boys. He suddenly fell off the chair, and died some fifteen minutes later. A doctor was at once sent for, and in the meantime Father McGulgan administered the last rites of the Church. The young man was dead when the doctor arrived; this was about 11 o'clock. The sudden death of their comrade cast a gloom over the camp. Batt's tug was despatched to the scene of the occurrence and brought the body to the city about midnight on Saturday. It was followed to his late home on Water Street by a large number of friends. A mother and three sisters are left to mourn a very sad bereavement. It is thought that death was caused by the rupture of an internal blood-vessel. The funeral will take place on Tuesday at 9 o'clock, a. m. to St. Dunstan's Cathedral. Among the floral tributes testifying to the esteem in which the deceased was held is one from the League of the Cross Boys.

SHAMROCK II AT AZORES.

PONTA DEL GABA, Azores, August 1.—Shamrock II, anchored at 8:15 p. m. and the Min let go her anchors at 8:50 p. m. The two yachts met excellent weather. 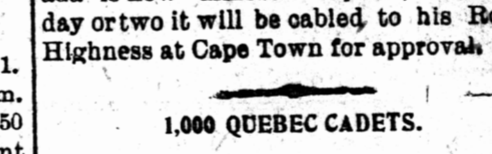
1,000 QUEBEC CADETS.
