## COST OF HELPFULNESS REACHES ETERNAL AGES

Sermon Preached Recently By Rev. H. E. Thomas Of The First Methodist Church Charlottetown

Luke 8: 46—But Jesus said, "some one did touch me; for I perceived that power had gone forth from me."

For the purpose we have in view it is not necessary to spend much time over this incident itself. Christ is on his way to call back to life, a daughter of a ruler of the Synagogue, and in the crowds which press upon him is an unfortunate woman whose heart had been long distressed with a physical infirmity. Although she often failed to procure relief yet she still carried a little faith and as the crowd surged around the Great Healer she reached forth her thin, bony hand, and touched the border of His garment and at once she felt the thrill of returning health.

"She only touched the hem of His garment,"

As to His side she stooped; Amid the crowds which gathered around Him, And straightway she was whole."

The great incident in this lesson is, that for the weak and a-cursed soul there is a great Physician, and when all else has failed we may reach out our lame hands and know his health-giving power.

"O, touch the hem of His garment And thou too, shalt be free."

This is the great lesson, but it is not the only one, and it is not the one which I wish to impress in this hour. Christ healed, Christ cured, but our point in the cost which was incurred. This miracle is sometimes called an "impurposed miracle," at other times there was deliberation, there was purpose, but here a miracle was wrought, unconsciously, and yet it finally came to the surface of consciousness because it cost. The Great Physician healed but even He must pay the cost. We have here I think a law of life which reaches from the first century down to the twentieth and includes in its sweep even the Son of God. All helpfulness cost and just in the degree in which we pay the cost are we able to help. Life evermore is fed by death. In earth and sea and sky And that a rose might have its life something must die.

This is first of all a PHYSICAL LAW. The heavens and the earth are ready to bear their testimony that helpfulness costs—Nature's hands are full of gifts to throw into our laps, but what a record is that which tells of what it cost. In order that we might have soil and forest and wheat and gold we must first of all have burning and cooling seasons, bloody slime—we are pointed off to the law of the persistence of force, or, "conservation of energy," but we can never consider these without a consideration of what this law costs. Oil turns to coal, coal to flame, and flame to heat, and heat to have takes place in all these changes. The sun sends its kindly beams upon us, but it must pay for its kindness and they tell us that at last it will be merely a burned out cinder.

If we listen to the sun it will tell us that it helps, but it must pay the cost. This is also AN ECONOMIC LAW. The agriculturist can speak to us in reference to this law for he knows that each crop that grows, robs the soil of its elements and not to know the proper rotation of crops is to fail with the soil.
