Yankees Sweep Both Ends Of Twin Bill With Tigers; Bees Defeat Cubs 6-2

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—Behind a home run barrage and two splendid pitching performances by Spud Chandler and Monte Pearson, the New York Yankees quashed the drive of Detroit Tigers today by sweeping an American League baseball doubleheader 5-4 and 6-2 before a noisy crowd of 34,528 cash customers.

Six of the 10 runs scored by the world champions were driven in by homers by Tom Henrich, Bill Knickerbocker and Red Rolfe. Rolfe's drive scored three runs in the first game, one in the second and one in the third and three in the seventh, the only session in which they could bunch their hits.

At Boston, Jim Bagby, Jr., pitching in masterly fashion chalked up his third win of the season for the Red Sox when his teammates pounded three St. Louis pitchers for 15 hits and a 6-1 verdict.

Henry must have known yesterday how Barney felt, because it was no secret that Barney's face was terribly swollen and that he was grieving for his lost welterweight title. But it was typical of Armstrong, a friendly little negro, that he would want to say he was sorry.

Armstrong is a vengeful fighter. He has been called many kinds of assassin and human destroyer, lately. But outside the ring he is an exceptionally likeable and pleasant person.

Even should he add that lightweight crown to his title collection when he meets champion Lou Ambers July 6, there is not likely to be a popular demand for "white hope" to knock Henry's ears down.

He is such an amazing fighter and wears his laurels so modestly that his popularity is likely to increase with every scrap.

At 26, he is a solid family man, with a wife and a child and a home in Los Angeles. He sings in his church choir every Sunday when he is at home.
