Annual Meeting W. M. S. Presbyterian

The annual meeting of the Presbyterian of the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was held at Murray Harbor North on July 11th. There was a large representation of delegates and other members of auxiliaries from all over the Island.

The President, Mrs. Jardine, of Kensington, occupied the chair. After the devotional exercises the minutes were read and the roll of auxiliaries called.

The following nominating committee was appointed—Mrs. Charles Ross, Mrs. W. A. Stewart, Miss McNutt, Mrs. Bernard, Mrs. Benj. Clow and Mrs. Brown.

Miss Jessie Nicholson and Miss Lauretta McDonald were appointed a committee for credentials.

Mrs. Chas. Ross and Mrs. W. M. McMillan were appointed a committee for resolution courses.

Rev. A. B. Brown of Tyne Valley conveyed to the Presbyterian the greetings of the Presbytery. He also gave a short address in which he spoke of the greatness of the missionary work of the Presbyterian Church, which extends from the frozen north to the tropics.

Mr. Brown spoke of the great loss sustained by the Murray Harbor North Church in the death of their elder, Mr. C. D. McLure, whose fidelity to the cause will still live and bless his church.

The greetings of the Murray Harbor North congregation were conveyed by Rev. D. V. O'Meara. He too made reference to the death of Mr. McLure. His prayer to God, he said, was to raise another to take the place of him whose last act was one of help to his church.

The greetings were replied to by Mrs. S. C. Moore, who, in a short but appropriate address expressed the appreciation of the Presbytery for the greetings received.

The Secretary, Mrs. S. C. Moore, reported a great increase in the number of active members, and also 11 new life members. Two new auxiliaries have been organized during the year, making in all thirty auxiliaries.

The Secretary of Young People's Work, Miss Jessie Fulton, reported greatly increased interest in the Young People's Work, and also a remarkable increase in membership.

The report of the Mission Band Secretary was read by Miss Helen Profit. Her report showed an increase in the number of 197 and an amount raised by the mission bands. The Secretary of Literature, Miss Ethel Stewart reported that on account of greatly increased membership she had been unable to supply the demand for the annual book, "Fifty Years of Missionary Work." This is a history of the Women's Missionary Society since its organization in 1876. It is for sale at only 30 cents per copy, although it cost 19 3/4 cents to print it.

The financial report was read by the treasurer Miss Mary McNutt, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Miss Stewart and carried.

The Presbytery with much regret accepted the resignation of Mrs. Rogers the Jardine, of Kensington, and the Treasurer Miss McNutt of Charlottetown.

Mutch, Charlottetown; Sec'y.—Mrs. L. A. Moore; Treasurer—Miss Bertie Profit; Home Mission Sec'y.—Mrs. D. Stewart, Tyne Valley; Mission Band Sec'y.—Miss Miriam Profit, Kensington; Young People's Work Sec'y.—Miss Jessie Fulton, Charlottetown; Literature Sec'y.—Miss Ethel Stewart, Summerside.

Mrs. L. A. Moore of North Sydney, who is President of the Women's Missionary Society, Eastern Division, was present at the Presbytery. Her long experience in missionary work, together with her pleasing personality, has made her a very welcome visitor at the Presbytery. Her address was at the foreign mission fields. She told of the work among the Koreans in Japan, at the head of which is Rev. Luther Young. For this work \$10,000 has been allocated. In Korea itself the Presbyterian Church has a college at Pyeung Yang. It is from this college Mr. Young gets his trained native helpers.

She spoke of the New Hebrides, where our P. E. I. missionaries, Revs. John and James Gordon gave their lives as martyrs. There buildings are to be erected at a cost of \$10,000.00 in memory of Mrs. Burns the President of the first missionary society. Before closing her address, Mrs. Moore told of the suggested allocations for Home

This gives new courage to young Hogan. Helen urges him on to avenge her brother's death and, in a fight with Big Joe, he smashes a terrific uppercut to the bully's jaw, which drops him. MacKinnon And Power Sentenced. (Continued from page 1)

ther the fact that you did believe him in some particular would discredit on the rest of his evidence is a matter for you entirely," he said.

He closed by warning the jury that they were trying the prisoner who was before them, and him alone. Further, if there was a reasonable doubt in their minds as to whether or no the prisoner committed the crime, they were to give the prisoner the benefit of the doubt.

The jury retired at 2.55 p. m. and returned at 3.55 p. m., reporting a disagreement. They were told by His Lordship to return, and reconsider.

While the jury in the Mallet case were out His Lordship Chief Justice Matheson passed sentence upon Archibald MacKinnon, found guilty of manslaughter. He said: "The crime you have committed in causing the death of a human being by careless violence is aggravated by your flight from the scene of the disaster in utter disregard of what happened to your victim.

2. No witness testified to previous good conduct on your part and (3) The jury found not any cause for recommending you to mercy.

4. The extreme penalty which the law provides is imprisonment for life.

5. But in the absence of any other mitigating circumstances I will take into account your youth and in the hope that in the days which lie before you, you may come to realize what your duty is—what you owe to those by natural ties dependent upon you and may yet redeem the past.

The sentence of the Court is that you be imprisoned in the Penitentiary at Dorchester for a period of 7 years."

His Lordship the Chief Justice next passed sentence upon Clarence Power, who had been found guilty of perjury, with a strong recommendation for mercy. His sentence was as follows:

You have been convicted of the crime of perjury, for which the law provides a severe penalty.

The jury of intelligent men who tried and convicted you found in the circumstances of your case grounds for a strong recommendation to mercy.

I am giving that recommendation full effect in imposing the sentence. The sentence of the court is that you be imprisoned in the common goal of Queens County for the period of one year, with hard labour, subject to the remission of the time already spent by you in the said prison upon this charge.

Saunders made application to have the proceedings stayed, and moved Louis Binns stayed, and moved for his release from jail.

In this connection he stated that it appeared from the testimony that Binns would go free if he turned King's Evidence. As for himself, he had made no promise to this effect, and disclaimed all responsibility, but, in view of the fact of the promise having been made, he asked to have the proceedings stayed.

His Lordship granted both motions.

At 4.40 p. m. the jury once more returned and again reported a disagreement, standing 8 for acquittal and 4 for conviction. They were accordingly discharged by His Lordship, and the case was adjourned to be heard again at the next term of the Supreme Court.

Before the close of the evening service, Rev. R. H. Stavert made the announcement that the Summer School would be held at Cameo Cove from August 6th to 12th.

The meeting closed with the Doxology and the Benediction pronounced by Rev. D. V. O'Meara.
