blushed crimson when bobby-coats admired their natty uniforms. Apple pie, ice cream and hot dogs didn't impress them.

"But perhaps the clearest picture of the Soviet attitude occurred at the Toronto Police Games, where a Russian tug-of-war team easily beat a RCN eleven. The Russians spat on their hands, grabbed the rope and yanked the mauls off their feet. After making sure—through an interpreter—that they had won the match, the Russians dropped the rope, turned their backs, and walked stolidly off the field in a body. In the Soviet creed there was apparently no place for congratulations or the old college yell.

"Was Moscow afraid of its sailors succumbing to the capitalistic blandishments of the West? Was their aloofness inspired by orders from the USSR? To these questions Torontonians got no answer. But they did learn that the barbed wire surrounding the Soviet bivouac had no significance—that it had enclosed this section of the RCN camp long before the Russians came."

Mrs. Frances Holl Trainor sent the extract to her son, Lieut. William Trainor, R.C.N.V.R., who was posted with the Russians, and received the following comment:

"I enjoyed your latest with enclosure very much. First of all, that article on the Russians is pure punk. The officers spend most of their time in 'York' ward-room playing cards, knocking down neat rye and being friendly to everyone. Our own ratings like the Russian ratings very much. Of course the big obstacle to fraternization is the language barrier. Only one or two officers know any English worth considering. The other ratings I chatted gaily with one who was limited to 'good morning', 'good evening' and 'excuse me'. Needless to say, the conversation sparkled. All of which shows said article to be stupid. The situation would be identical with a Canadian group in Russia.

"So far, our work with the Russians is held up. The first ship is delayed another two weeks. We've met the Russian officers and find them a very decent bunch. Most of the day is spent looking at instructional films with the Russian structure films with the Russian aid of interpreters may not be too easy.

"We've been going out daily on runs with a Russian crew. They do all the work and we look on—rather soft. They're pretty quick on the uptake and seem to have everything down pat.

"Yesterday, as well as being V.J. day, was the day of commissioning for the first mine-sweeper U.S.S.R. 'S. Hickory Lake'. The ceremony took place at 4 p.m. with many high-ranking officers, Russian and Canadian present. Quite a party followed on board. An R.C.A.F. Group Captain, who was extremely sociable, sat in a large plate of fish and chili sauce. The manager of Grew Boat works, which built her, then proceeded to kiss the Russian Commodore and poured a drink of rum down his front simultaneously. There's no fool, etc."

London — A Parliamentary Christmas pudding, containing rum and old ale, was stirred recently in preparation for this year's House of Commons Yuletide.

The wife of the Speaker of the House of Commons visited the institution's kitchen to wield a pastry spoon when the 240 pound pudding was created to provide for the 300 Members of Parliament.

The recipe: Fifteen pounds of flour, 30 pounds of bread crumbs, 30 pounds of sugar; 15 ounces of baking powder, 15 ounces spice, 46 pounds of currants and raisins, 45 pounds of raisins, four pounds of peanuts, seven pounds of orange peel, one ounce of lemon essence 14 graded nutmegs, 20 pounds of dried eggs, 18 bins of old ale, four bottles of rum and two quarts of milk.
