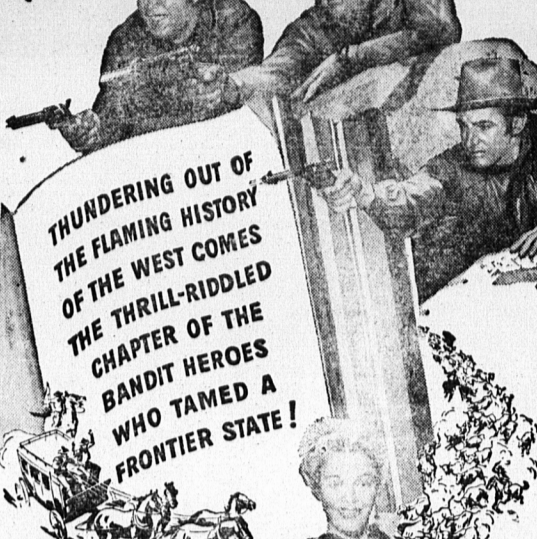

Dust bin—Retractable under-turret for gunner. Erk—An aircraftman novice. George—The automatic pilot. Get cracking—Get going. Go to the movies—Go into action. Gong—To get a medal. Greenhouse—Plastic cover for cockpit. Hip flask—Service revolver. Klipper control—Coastal command aircraft conveying fishing boats. Kites—Airmen, a mechanic's term. Mae West—A chest life preserver (inflatable waistcoat). House traps—Submarines. Mickey Mouse—Automatic lever releasing bombs. Put up a black—Poor attempt. Roller skate—A tank. Scrambled eggs—Cold oak leaves on an air marshal's hat. Shot down in flames—Reprimanded by a superior officer or crossed in love. Squirt—Machine gun burst. Taped—Solved. Walling Winnie—Air raid siren. Wuffs—Gun noises.

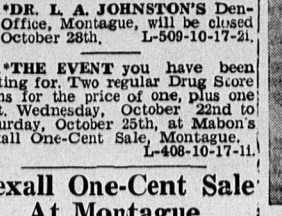

Appeals for more Recruits from Quebec

SENIORITY CLUB, Que., Oct. 15—(CP)—A French-Canadian soldier and diplomat, Georges Vanier, appealed today to the mayors and aldermen of Quebec province for their fullest co-operation in urging young men to enlist in the Canadian active army. "We are not getting enough men," said Brig. Vanier, who is overseas commanding the 2nd Canadian Division (Quebec). "The adjutant-general has told us recently of the needs of our overseas forces and the call for men is most urgent, most pressing." "The voluntary system of enlistment is the best system, but if we don't get the men we need, then the conscription bill will have to carry on the work without their aid. We should be proud that we already have several French Canadian regiments overseas, but the call is for more and more." Brig. Vanier was addressing the annual convention of the Quebec Union of Municipalities.
