Ex-Premier Drury Star Witness In Conspiracy Case

TORONTO, Oct. 24.—Trial of the former Treasurer of Ontario, Peter Smith, on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the province in connection with the purchase by the Province of Duty today was adjourned for the afternoon session was adjourned, Herbert Lennox, K. C., Counsel for the defence had opened his address to the jury. The star witness for the defence today was T. C. Drury, former Premier of Ontario, who declared that the purchase of the bonds had been authorized by the full cabinet, but that he had been much surprised to learn that the principals of the Aemilius Jarvis firm, who stand charged of conspiracy to defraud, made \$500,000 out of the transaction in answer to questions the ex-Premier declared he had no personal knowledge that his former colleague, Peter Smith, had received any of this \$500,000. Following the conclusion of the Crown's case today defence counsel moved for dismissal of the charges against all four Peter Smith, Aemilius Jarvis, Sr., Aemilius Jarvis, Jr. and Harry Pepall, the latter three of

the Jarv's Brokerage firm, but Mr. Justice Meredith refused the application. During the day the evidence taken in England for the defence, in which the British Bankers and Brokers, who had been connected with the bond transactions put through in England by Aemilius Jarvis, Sr., was read. This without exception was to the effect that nothing of any apparent irregular nature had transpired in England in connection with these deals.
