MOCK PARLIAMENT.—On next Monday night at 8 o'clock His Excellency will open Mock Parliament with the usual formalities and it is the intention of the Government to proceed at once to the consideration of the address. One of our prominent public men has kindly consented to act as Governor General.

The thermometer on Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning made another record and registered 19 degrees below zero before daylight yesterday. The temperature on Tuesday night was the lowest for a number of years the nearest approach for some time being 17.5 degrees in 1903-4.

Deceased was a consistent member of the Baptist Church.

The extremely cold weather of yesterday developed last evening into a snow storm which gradually increased in violence during the night and towards morning it was undoubtedly the wildest of the season. A heavy drift prevailed which will undoubtedly block the railway greatly today.

The evening freight coming to the city last night from the west and due to arrive at 7:30 p. m. was considerably delayed west of Summerside by the storm and did not reach the city till nearly morning. Another engine and snow-plough had to be sent out to her rescue. The special reached Cape Traverse last night without difficulty.

THE MAILS AND THE STEAMERS

The first real stoppage of the winter boats occurred yesterday when the easterly wind prevailing during the early morning completely blocked the straits. The Stanley which is at Georgetown and the Minto which is at Pictou both made efforts to reach the opposite sides but were compelled to return to port and while the prevailing winds continue it is not probable that a crossing can be made.

Yesterday at noon it was decided to send the mails by the Capes and the mails were brought back to town yesterday afternoon and taken to Cape Traverse by the special last night. The mails now at Pictou will also be taken back to Cape Tormentine.

If arrangements can be completed and the weather be favorable the ice-boats will cross each way today. It is not yet definitely ascertained, however, whether sufficient men can be secured in time to make a crossing today. The regular crews are located in different parts of the west and the Marine Department thinks it will be improbable that the men will reach the Capes in time to make a crossing before tomorrow.


