GERMAN VIEW OF THE BELGIANS.

BRUSSELS, Feb. 8.—"The Belgians" said General Von Bissing, the new German Governor General of Belgium in an interview today with a representative of the Associated Press, are "politically unscrupulous children. They believe their liberation from German rule may come at any moment and they are strengthened in this belief by the French newspapers, as well as by some neutral newspapers which continually the smuggled in."

Asked whether the Belgians had attempted to throw obstacles in his way, "Only in petty ways," he replied, "by pin-pricks here and there. Undoubtedly they would like to, but they know if they did I would at once adopt very drastic measures."

OF LOCAL INTEREST.—Rev. H. E. Thomas, St. John, former pastor of the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown, figures quite prominently in the press reports of the police war, which is now raging in St. John. Chief Simpson, at the request of Commissioner McLellan, reduced a sergeant of police, to the ranks, with the result that a number of citizens, among them Mr. Thomas, raised an objection. In the course of an interview between Chief Simpson, Commissioner McLellan, Rev. W. R. ISLANDER HONORED.—The following is taken from the Edmonton Journal of the 1st inst. Mr. Hyndman is a brother of Mr. A. W. Mr. Hyndman had given the seat no thought from a personal angle until many prominent Conservatives pressed him Saturday to go before the convention. He has not yet given his answer, which will likely be largely influenced by the attitude of the candidate already in the field. It is urged on behalf of candidates that it would prove an excellent candidate; one who should carry the seat without great difficulty; and that he would be a first class member after his election. The question of his candidature will, in all probability, be settled today.

INTERESTING DEBATE.—On Tuesday evening the students of the Long Course in Agriculture held a very interesting debate on the subject of raising more profitable in Prince Edward Island than milk production on the average farm. The debate was opened by Sylvère Arsenault who dealt at length on the hardness and unpleasantness for both men and women of dairy farming. He also pointed out that the cost of procuring pure bred cattle prevented many farmers from taking up this branch of Agriculture. Harold Dobie replied on behalf of dairy cattle. He pointed out very clearly that the milking of cows was not more unpleasant than any other farm work and that the man who found dairying unpleasant was not a suitable man to carry on dairy farming. He stated that poultry raising, where it had been tried exclusively in Prince Edward Island, had not been the financial success that dairying had been. Gloris Richard, J. J. Gallant and Benjamin Arsenault followed on behalf of poultry while Parvin Cass, Loyola McCarthy and Roddie McAuley spoke in favour of dairying. The debate was most interesting and interesting points were brought out. The next debate will be: Resolved that beef cattle pay better than dairy cattle on the ordinary farm of P. E. I. It will be opened by Parvin Cass.
