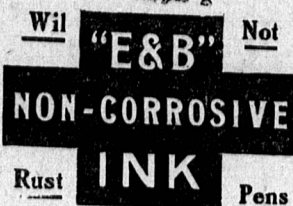

THE VALUE OF A YAWN.

Yawning may be rude—especially in
company—but it is good thing for
you to do.

For one thing, it ventilates the
lungs. When you take an ordinary
breath the lungs are not completely
filled, nor are they emptied by an ordi-
nary respiration. There is a certain
quantity of air left in the lungs al-
ways, which physiologists call residual
air.

This air in times becomes foul and
affects the blood and through the
blood the nervous centres. Certain
nerves get tickled as it were and the
result is a yawn, stretching the lungs
to their fullest extent, filling them
with clean, fresh air and driving the
foul air out.

That's one reason why it is good
to yawn. For another, yawning opens
and stretches and ventilates all the
various passages leading to the lungs.
You will perhaps be surprised to
know that yawning is even beneficial
to your hearing.

The cracking sound which you so
often hear when giving an extra big
yawn is due to the stretching and
opening of the eustachian tubes.
These tubes communicate between the
ear and the back of the throat. If
they are congested which happens
when you have a bad cold in the
head, people complain of deafness.

If you feel inclined to yawn then do
so. It is nature's way of cleaning out
your lungs and air passages.—Pear-
son's Weekly.
