

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

FRIDAY, May 12.
The House met at 11 a. m.
Hon. Mr. Farquharson presented a Bill entitled an Act regarding the registration of births and deaths. Read a first time.
Mr. K. K. Kham asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to build a bridge across the river at Kingsborough, in order to enable the public to get to their fishing houses and to afford them a way for hauling seaweed?
In reply to Mr. K. Kham the Commissioner of Public Works said there has been a survey made, and that he was strongly inclined to grant the request of the people; he will look up the matter and if the expense will not be too great the work will be performed.
Mr. K. Kham asked the Commissioner of Public Works if a petition has been received from certain persons of New Acadia praying for a new road from New Acadia to Bear River Line Road, or near the railway station, and if so what action the Government intend to take in regard thereto?
In reply to Mr. K. Kham the Commissioner of Public Works said such petition had been received and is under the consideration of the Government.
Mr. D. A. McKinnon asked the Commissioner of Public Works whether a petition has been received from Allan J. McLeod, Angus Livingstone and others, asking that the Livingstone Road be continued to connect with the Forest Hill Road, and if the Government propose to grant the prayer of this petition.
Mr. D. McKinnon asked the Commissioner of Public Works if a petition has been received with respect to the Township boundary lines between Lots 59 and 61 and 61 and 63, and whether the same would be surveyed as prayed for?
Mr. D. A. McKinnon asked the Leader of the Government whether a petition has been received regarding repairs to Creek River Wharf, and if the matter will be attended to?
In reply to Mr. D. A. McKinnon the Commissioner of Public Works said the petitions had been received and will receive the attention of the Government.
Mr. Forbes asked the Commissioner of Public Works if a petition was received asking for the opening of a road from Roseberry, Wood Island Road to Flat River Road Lot 60, and what action the Government intend to take in said petition?
In reply to Mr. Forbes the Commissioner of Public Works said the petition had been received and will no doubt receive the consideration of the Government.
Mr. D. A. McKinnon asked the Leader of the Government whether the petition for a school at Fairchild's Point has been considered, and if the people of that place will soon be given the benefit of a public school?
In reply to Mr. D. A. McKinnon Hon. Mr. Farquharson said, a petition regarding a school at Fairchild's Point had been received, and immediately after the session it will receive the attention of the Government.
Mr. D. A. McKinnon moved the House into committee. Mr. Reid in the Chair.

WASHINGTON May 12.—(Special) Prof S. P. Langley who was given \$25,000 by the board of ordnance to experiment with flying machines gave it a test Thursday, but it was not a success.

PARIS May 12.—(Special) A guard has gone to Devil's Island to bring Dreyfus back to France as the Court of Cassation will favor a revision of his trial and sentence.

LONDON, May 12.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News predicts that the prime minister will resign in three or four weeks, seeking defeat on some insignificant question, because to fail on the Dreyfus question would mean the end of his political career.

John Costigan Deserts the Lib.-Con. Party.

SIR CHARLES TALKS.

Many Delegations Interview the Laurier Government.

OTTAWA, May 12.—(Special)—The government heard delegations today of insurance men asking better terms for opportunities to invest, other delegations in favor and against the Ottawa bridge scheme. Consideration was promised.

OTTAWA, May 11.—Hon. John Costigan today formally announced his secession from Liberal Conservative party and his adhesion to the ministerial platform and policy.

In an interview, he said to-day: "I do not think that the men who now pose as representatives of the old Conservative party, to which I belonged and still belong, are by any means the representatives of the Conservative instinct in Canada in politics. I have left these people, and I have no objection to your saying so."

Sir Charles Tupper speaking of the matter this evening said: "I am not at all surprised to see the announcement made. He now belongs to the government party. I think the correspondence read in the house by Mr. Roche discloses the humiliating position in which Hon. Mr. Costigan placed himself."

"The difficulty will be for the government to defend the means by which they have acquired his support rather than for any person else to explain it. All I am surprised at is Mr. Costigan had not sufficient self respect to leave the front benches of the conservative party. It is too late for him to raise any question of principle on the ground upon which the separation between himself and the Conservative party has been made."

A discussion of the papers to be brought down by the Minister of Inland Revenue moved for by Mr. Roche will leave no room for doubt in the mind of any person how Mr. Costigan's support was obtained by the party in power. The government need have no anxiety about his vote so long as they retain power. After what has already taken place between him and the government it is clear that the less Mr. Costigan talks about independent action the better."
