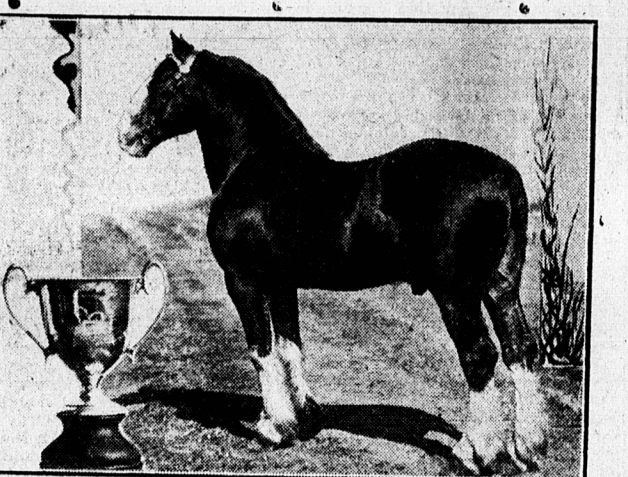

To correct the bad habits of others is often to form a bad habit yourself. So long as criticism does not react unfavorably either on the critic or on the criticized it is beneficial; but when it is accompanied by a sense of impatience in the one and of resentment in the other it becomes nagging, and should be dropped—even if the fault that it justly objects to continue to flourish. The naggers and the nagged are, as a rule, extremely fond of each other. You are not likely to nag anyone that you do not care about. In other words, nagging is primarily a family custom, and is chiefly practiced between husbands and wives, parents, brothers, and sisters. A certain affectionate intimacy seems to be required for it. Few people nag their servants, even if the corners are seldom dusted and the silver and brasses polished only under protest. The mistress endures such a state of things as best she can, and when she can endure it no longer she "makes a change." Yet long-suffering mistresses are sometimes nagging wives and mothers—for the reason, no doubt, that in their conjugal or maternal pride they are always striving to raise the standard of those most dear to them. In the same way a man may nag his wife, but he either tolerates or discharges his office boy.

The Steamer sails from Southampton for New York Wednesday April 10th on her maiden trip. The Titanic and her sister ship the Olympic are the largest vessels in the world, and the most comfortable, surpassing anything heretofore contemplated in the luxury of their proportions of their public rooms and staterooms accommodation. The Titanic is the first steamer to be built with private promenades in connection with some of the suites. Some idea of the enormous proportions of this steamer may be gained when it is stated that the Promenade deck has an unbroken sweep of 190 yards on either side. The main dining saloon has seating capacity for approximately 600 first class passengers and the restaurant for approximately 200 passengers. PROVINCE LOSES WORTHY MAN IN WILLIAM MCLEAN

Prince Edward Island lost another of its old landmarks Monday in the person of William McLean who passed that afternoon at 2.30 o'clock at the home of his son A. A. McLean, M. P. Fitzroy St. Born on Feb. 27, 1827, the deceased was in his 86th year. He was the eldest son of Angus and Mrs. McLean of Point Prim who emigrated to this province from the Isle of Skye in 1803 and took up their residence at the Point. In his early youth the deceased came to Charlottetown and became engaged in shipbuilding with William MacGill. Adapting himself to his work, then at its best as an industry in P. E. I., Mr. McLean engaged in it to a wider extent and established a shipyard at Belfast which he conducted in conjunction with a general store at Eldon, now occupied by Jas. St. C. Moore. After having engaged in these enterprises for some years and having by strict attention to business, always keen, discreet and upright in his methods, he began to assume financial interests throughout the province and disposed of the business and shipyard at Eldon and Belfast and removed to Charlottetown in 1866. At this time he entered the old Union Bank of P. E. Island and in the capacity of accountant began to be even more widely known. Later he became cashier of the Merchants Bank of P. E. Island and filled this important position with marked efficiency for nearly thirty years. Since the dissolution of the Bank he has lived in quiet retirement. Mr. McLean was a consistent and faithful adherent of the Presbyterian Church and was one of the oldest elders of St. James Church, City. Born of Scottish parentage of the old school the deceased seemed imbued not only physically but also mentally with all the excellent characteristics for which the race merit credit, kind and genial with friends and wholehearted with his guests; open (Continued on page 7)
