SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

May 28, 1916

THE COUNCIL OF JERUSALEM

(Acts 15:1-35)

Golden Text:—"Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free."

The preaching of the Gospel to Gentiles produced some unexpected results and thereby raised new problems for the young church to solve. The gospel had begun with the declaration by Jesus that the Kingdom of God was at hand and that he himself was the expected Messiah who would establish it. The earliest preaching of the disciples of Jesus resolved itself to the simple message that Jesus was the Messiah prophesied of old, and that in token of his messiahship he had been raised from the dead. All of this seemed at first to concern the great Gentile world in no way. It was for the Jews, and for the Jews only, an announcement that the ideal of their faith had been reduced to reality at last. But the first appearance of nationalism presented by the Gospel soon gave place to a marvellous aspect of adaptation to all mankind. When the Messiahship of Jesus was closely examined it disclosed an ethical and spiritual content which concerned every man. It was a gospel of salvation from sin through Christ. And when the matter was put to the test it was found that Gentiles, with but slight if any connection with Judaism eagerly accepted this Gospel. Large numbers of them believed in Christ.

The problem then which confronted the leaders of the new movement was that of the relation of these Gentile believers to the Jewish system. To the Jews the authority of Moses was still paramount. To the Gentile believers it seemed to be of no vital importance to observe the ceremonial law as given by Moses. And the most fundamental of all the rites of the ceremonial law was that of circumcision, for by it the individual was formally adopted into the commonwealth of Israel. Should Gentiles becoming Christians be circumcised, or in other words first become Jews? This was the problem.

Verse 1. The question assumed importance at Antioch upon the appearance there of certain Jewish converts to Christianity from Jerusalem. The apostles seem to have received into the Christian communion Gentile converts without subjecting them to the ritual law. To these men from Judea addressed themselves, declaring that conformity with the ritual was absolutely necessary to salvation. The incident proves that the case of Cornelius (11:18) was not regarded by all as a definite precedent. Old views are tenacious. It was difficult for the more conservative spirits among the Christians to understand that a new order of things had made its appearance with Christ. It is always necessary to canvass a new practice thoroughly before it can vindicate its vitality.

Verse 2-5. Since Paul and Barnabas were responsible for the reception into the Christian Church of Gentiles, they assumed the defence of that course before the Judaizers from Jerusalem. But as these could not be persuaded to see the matter in the light in which it was presented by Paul and Barnabas, it was determined to refer the question to the Apostles and elders at Jerusalem. Thus for the first time in the experience of the church the principles for the settlement of mooted questions were brought in view.

These principles are: First that the judgment of the whole social body is more trustworthy than that of any special section of it. Antioch might have decided to endorse the course of Paul
