## Senators Drop Second Tilt To Giants

### Terry Plays Hunch; O'Doul Gets Single

Giant Manager Highly Pleased With Pitching—Cronin Grimly Determined As Scene Shifts To Washington.

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Oct. 4.—(A.P.)—Frank (Lefty) O'Doul, who has led the National League in batting, but never had been in a world series game, sat on the Giants' bench this afternoon nursing his favorite bet and a great ambition.

The bases were full of Giants and the Senators were one big run to the good when the "man in the green suit" turned to Hal Schumacher, sitting beside him.

"Hal," said he. "I've always been good luck to you. If Bill will stick me in there I'll win this ball game for you sure as I'm a knee high."

A moment later Manager Bill Terry had played one of his famous "hunches" (that's what Bill called it after the game), and there stood Lefty at the plate, waving his war club at "General" Alvin Crowder. Another moment and there was a "crack" ringing in the ears of 35,000 fans. The ball streaked to centre field, two runners sped across the pan, and the Giants had sewed up their second straight victory in the big series. They got more runs, but they were not needed.

The next time O'Doul met Schumacher was in the dressing rooms. Lefty was in his street clothes, having headed straight for the clubhouse shortly after delivering his momentous clout. Prince Hal rushed in and grabbed him.

"Thanks, Lefty," he grinned.

"Not at all, Hal. I told you I'd do it for you, didn't I?"

Of all the hits he has gathered in a long and honorable swatting career, O'Doul admitted he got the biggest thrill out of today's telling punch.

Terry, while plenty pleased with the success of his "hunch," refused to be carried away by his team's prodigious clouting. Schumacher was his boy.

"That's wonderful pitching boys," he said. "I'll stick by what I've said all year—pitching will predominate." These were Bill's very words.

Someone brought in word that Terry's rival, Manager Joe Cronin, was a little down in the mouth over the failure of his team to hit.

"Sure they're not hitting," exclaimed Memphis Bill. "And I'll tell you why they're not hitting. They haven't seen any pitching like we've thrown at them the last two days. And I'll tell you something else. They're going to look over some more pitching that's just as good tomorrow at Washington, when Fred Fitzsimmons goes in there."

Outside of naming Earl Whitehill as tomorrow's starting flinger, Cronin had very little to say on any subject. The American Leaguers were pretty well subdued, even though Joe himself, insisted that his club was "two down and four to go."

### CALUMET BROWNIE LOSES MATCH RACE

Darkey Grattan Wins in Straight Heats From North Sydney Horse.

HALIFAX, Oct. 4.—Calumet Brownie, whose flying hoofs earned him the reputation of America's fastest horse last year, went down to defeat in straight heats today before Nova Scotia owned Darkey Grattan in a match race at the Nova Scotia Exhibition.

The speedy American gelding, now owned by Mrs. Margaret Ballard of North Sydney, N. S., forced the black Grattan, however, to come within a half second of equaling the track record in the first encounter of their two-heat race. Darkey Grattan paced the first heat in 2:08 1/4; the second in 2:10. The big son of Grattan Royal is owned by H. T. Fulton of Upper Stewiacke, N. S., and was driven today by Conroy. Joe Hood handled the reins over Calumet Brownie, who appeared out of condition.

In the 2:30 Trot and Pace event of the same card, Mac Volo, owned by H. O'Brien of Alberton, P. E. I., won in straight heats from a classie field. With two seconds and a fourth, High Toby, owned by H. T. Fulton, gained second money. The Junior Free-For-All went to Star G., owned by J. H. O'Brien of Halifax, in successive heats. H. T. Fulton's Teese took second money.

### GIANTS NOW TWO UP

The World's Series scene now shifts to Griffith Stadium in Washington.

"Lefty" O'Doul's single in the hectic sixth inning yesterday broke up a great pitching duel between Schumacher and Crowder.

Previous to this inning Crowder had let the Giants down with only two hits, while the young hurler of the New Yorkers had granted but three.

Schumacher got out of a serious jam in the sixth when he struck out Bluge with the bases loaded.

Mel Ott was a marked man yesterday, being walked twice and thrown out in his other two times at bat.

The slugging outfielder of the Giants leads the batters of both teams with an average of .567.

Cronin sent three pinch hitters to bat in the ninth yesterday but to no avail. They were retired in order.

The youthful manager of the Senators drew a round of applause in the third inning yesterday when he made a spectacular stop of Jackson's grounder to throw the Giant third baseman out at first.

Alex McColl who replaced Thomas for Washington in the seventh inning, tied a World Series record when he retired the Giants on three pitched balls.

Still another record was equalled when Ott retired the Washington team by making three putouts in right field in the seventh.

And still another one, Joe Moore's two hits in the sixth frame equalled another long-standing record.

12 batters faced the Washington pitchers in the sixth frame yesterday.

Joe Kuhel turned in a sweet performance at first base for the Senators accepting 15 chances without an error.

The World Series mark for first basemen is 19.

Two double plays featured yesterday's tilt, each team having one.

The Giants have now collected 20 hits to Washington's 10.

Fair hitting for a team that has been labelled "the hitless wonders." Fitzsimmons and Whitehill will likely be the starting hurlers today.

## GOTHAM CREW TAKE SECOND GAME FROM AMERICAN LEAGUERS

Big Sixth Inning Uprising Nets Giants Six Runs And Drives Crowder From Mound—Schumacher Pitches Five-Hit Game—Goslin Gets Homer In Third.

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Oct. 4.—Playing like a team that is just beginning to realize its own strength and enjoy it thoroughly, the rampant New York Giants swarmed over Washington Senators today with swashbuckling confidence, routed the veteran Alvin (General) Crowder with one concentrated outburst of batting power and scored their second straight World Series victory, 6-1.  
For the second straight day, the "hitless wonders," who knocked all the advance dope into a cocked hat by romping off with the National League pennant, continued to punch the Washington pitching staff groggy and conduct a surging drive for the championship.

#### Spectacular Batting Display

They knocked Crowder, ace right-hander of the Senators, from the box with a six-run outburst in the sixth inning, a spectacular batting display that aroused a crowd of 35,461 cash customers to delirious enthusiasm.

They again outdid their high-powered rivals by a two to one margin, while their young right-hander, Hal Schumacher, picked up where Carl Hubbell left off and made his World Series debut with a brilliant five-hit victory over the American League champions.

#### Schumacher Wild at Times

Schumacher had streaks of wildness, but the only damaging blow he yielded was "Goose" Goslin's third-inning homer and he pulled himself safely out of his deepest hole, in the sixth, just before the Giants touched off the fireworks that blasted Crowder off the mound and settled the ball game.

#### Two New Hitting Heroes

The home run bat of "Little Mel" Ott was silenced today, mainly by the strategy of twice passing the little outfielder, but two new hitting heroes stepped into the big jambores today with the blows that broke up the Washington defence. The celebrated "man in the green suit," Frank (Lefty) O'Doul made his first appearance of the series, as a pinch-hitter, and delivered a hard single to centre with the bases full, while the crowd gave an ovation to the former National League batting king. These were the first two runs of the big sixth inning, furnishing what proved to be the deciding margin, but sturdy Gus Mancuso, the Giants' backstop, capped the climax of the rally by pulling the ancient "squeeze play," bringing O'Doul across the plate and catching the entire Senator infield flat-footed.

#### Strategy Works

These two pieces of strategy, the substitution of O'Doul for Davis at the first critical stage of the Giants' offensive, and Mancuso's surprise bunt that went for a clean hit, were the high spots of the scoring outburst. Altogether the Giants collected eight hits, including a double by Manager Bill Terry, and sent an even dozen batmen to the plate before Al Thomas, in a relief role, stopped the rally.

Joe Moore, the agile left-fielder, started it with a single and drove in the last run with his second safe blow of the sixth inning.

Critz attempted sacrifice went wrong, forcing Moore, but in rapid succession Terry doubled to left, Ott walked to fill the bases and then O'Doul stepped into the picture.

The crowd was in wild turmoil as the old Brooklyn favorite, obtained by the Giants in a trade this year, fenced with the rapidly weakening Crowder. The count was two and two when Lefty cracked the ball past the pitcher on a line into centre-field. Critz and Terry romped home, while Ott galloped to third and came home on Travis

#### Jackson's hard single to centre.

#### Senators Caught Flat-footed

Probably the last thing the Senators expected at this juncture was a bunt by the heavy-footed Mancuso, slowest man on the New York team. Gus laid down a perfectly placed ball along the third base line, "squeezing" O'Doul across the plate and reaching first himself without even a gesture to catch him. Crowder finally fielded the ball, after both Bluge and Sewell acted somewhat dazed, but the pitcher got it too late for a throw to first.

Ryan furnished an interlude by striking out but Schumacher cracked a single to left field, scoring Jackson. Moore, up for the second time, walloped a single to centre, scoring Mancuso, and sounding "taps" for Crowder. It seemed questionable strategy by Manager Cronin in keeping Crowder under fire for so long and while it was obvious he was fast losing control of the situation.

All six runs were in when the "General" gave way to Al Thomas, another right-hander. Critz scratched an infield single off Cronin's glove, filling the bases again, but Terry hit into a force-out and the inning was over.

So was the ball game. With an unexpectedly fat lead, Schumacher steadied down, allowed only two hits in the last three innings and was never again in any real danger. The young right-hander's "sinker" was not always under complete control but he baffled the Senators, most of whom spent the afternoon "topping" the puzzling delivery.

#### Not Yet Licked

"We're two down and four to go," remarked Joe Cronin in a grim expression of confidence that the Senators are not yet licked, despite the way they have been out-hit, out-pitched and out-smarted by the National League champions for two straight days. The 26-year-old pilot of the Senators looks for a turn of the tide when they get back to home grounds, in the third game tomorrow, but they have not yet exhibited the offensive or defensive strength that carried them to the American League peak.

For the first time since 1922, when the Giants last were on top in the World Series, the National League tonight enjoyed a 2-0 lead in the battle for World Series honors. Since that time, the standard-bearers of the senior circuit have captured only three world championships.

#### Whitehill and Fitzsimmons Today

The Senators have two of their season's "big four" still unmarked, by Giants bats. Earl Whitehill and Monte Weaver are due for the pitching assignments tomorrow and Friday in Washington. Freddy Fitzsimmons, fast right-hander, will do the sharp-shooting for the National Leaguers tomorrow and Hubbell probably will be back in the box again Friday, particularly if there is a chance then for the Giants to make it four in a row.
