JOLIETTE, Que., Sept. 17 (CP)—His sanity restored after 10 years in a prison for the criminally insane, Armand Aubin will be tried at the next term of Court of King's Bench in Montreal for the murder of Joseph Brizard Sept. 3, 1936. Aubin, then a boy of 15 allegedly killed his farmer employer with an axe, cut up the body and buried it in the farmhouse basement. Allentists found him to be insane and his case never came to trial. Yesterday he appeared before the same judge who a decade ago committed him to the prison hospital. Medical authorities said he now is normal mentally and in condition to stand trial.

CANNED SALMON
Five hundred thousand cases of canned salmon will be distributed this year for sale in Canada and should reach retail stores in October or November.

BOSTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—C. I. O. seamen agreed tonight, at the request of the port of Boston authority to move strike-bound ships from piers so that A.P.L. long-shooters might unload 10 foreign flag vessels in the harbor without passing through picket lines.
