**Was Fastest Ship in World.**

Wreck of the Viper was Due to Difficulty of Reversing Turbine Engines.

LONDON, August 7.—Despatches received from Portsmouth regarding the wreck of the torpedo boat destroyer Viper off Alderney Island say that it is believed the well-known difficulty in reversing turbine engines contributed to the accident. The Viper was running at 20 knots when the fog set in. She was then eased down to 5 knots, and was running at that speed when she struck. When her cables parted her stern smashed on the rocks. She subsequently parted amidships and is now in three pieces, the stern end being

If there had been much sea running when the accident occurred it is probable that everybody aboard of her would have perished. As it was, the crew must have perished but for the assistance rendered by a French fishing smack, which helped the crew to reach the shore.

The Viper was in many respects the most remarkable boat afloat. She was the first vessel to be fitted with the famous steam turbine engines. She was also the fastest ship in the world. On her trial trip about one year ago she steamed at the rate of 43 miles an hour. Those who saw the trial said that the ship passed them with a roar indescribable, and

grand to behold. Her length was 210 feet, her beam 21 feet, and her displacement 360 tons. Her horse-power was 11,000. The hull was driven through the water at express-train speed by four screw shafts entirely independent of one another. Two shafts on one side were driven by one high and one low pressure turbine respectively. The only drawback to the use of these peculiar engines is the difficulty of reversing their action. Since going into commission, the Viper had been the object of great curiosity among naval architects generally.

**Ontario Cows Leading.**

Ontario cows are doing well in the dairy test at the Pan-American at Buffalo. Reports received by the Department of Agriculture show that the Canadian Jersey herd led the whole list of competitors in the week ending July 30, in the profit on the production of butter fat. The Canadian Holstein herd also led in another branch of the competition, the profit on the total amount of solids produced, their figures being \$9.35 for the week, based on 9 cents per pound for solids. The profit produced by the Jerseys on the butter fat for the week was \$8.78, the Guernseys, an American herd, being second, with \$8.61, and the Canadian herds of Ayrshire, French-Canadian and Holstein next in order, with \$8.08, \$7.31 and \$7.26 profit, respectively. The returns for the season so far indicate that the Canadian Holsteins will capture the prize for the net profit on total of solids, and for the profit on solids, combined with the loss or gain in live weight.

The following table shows the order of the leading competing herds for the butter fat prize for each of the respective weeks since June 11, the Ayrshires, Holsteins and Jerseys being Canadian and the Guernseys American herds.

It will be seen that the Guernseys and the Jerseys are pretty evenly matched, with the advantage coming latterly more to the side of the Jerseys.
