BOARD OF TRADE AND SLOW FREIGHT

A Series of Telegrams Telling the Story—The Council of the Board of Trade Trying to Get At the Facts.

In reply to telegraphic orders from Auld Brothers to forward their freight by the D. G. S. steamers as quickly as possible, the following telegram was received from the I. C. R. agent at Pictou: Pictou, May 10th, 1907. Auld Brothers, Charlottetown. Dominion Government Steamers will not accept freight from us.

M. C. WEBSTER. Mr. Lord, the Marine Agent here, stated before the Council of the Board of Trade on Saturday morning that the steamers never had any orders to refuse freight, and had never done so save in one case, Mr. Full's pending orders, and that the officers had asked for and were told there was no freight for them. They were always anxious to get whatever freight was offered.

As there seemed to be considerable discrepancy between Mr. Lord's statement and that of Mr. Webster, and not wishing to put the blame on the wrong shoulder, the Council asked Mr. Lord to wire Mr. Dodd Dwyer for full information, which he did as follows: Charlottetown, May 11th, 1907.

Dodd Dwyer, Agent Dept Marine & Fisheries, Pictou. M. C. Webster telegraphs Auld Brothers that "the Dominion steamers will not accept freight from us." Please wire at once reasons why, by whom or on whose authority are the Dominion steamers refusing freight for this Port. A. Lord.

REPLY. Pictou, May 11th, 1907. A. Lord, Agent Marine & Fisheries Dept., Charlottetown. Full's Corn only freight refused. This goes forward today, also three cars flour for Auld Brothers.

DODD DWYER. The above explanation was not satisfactory to the Council, and Mr. Lord again wired for the fullest information. Accordingly the following message was sent: Dodd Dwyer.

Agent Dept M & F, Pictou. Don't of Trade not satisfied with your reply. What grounds had Webster for telegram sent to Auld Brothers that steamers refused freight from Intercolonial for the Island? Is there any reason for cause. Urgent you should telegraph facts. Want the fullest information. A. Lord.

REPLY. A. Lord. Cor's agents in Charlottetown always with Webster's instructions regarding freight. These telegrams are never shown to me, and until this afternoon I have never seen any telegram from Auld Brothers or any other consignee to ship by Government steamers. It has always been customary for Navigation people to carry all freight when starting on route and if there were any orders for goods to be shipped by Government Steamers I did not hear of them. All freight offered, except Full's corn, went forward.

DODD DWYER. The Council know that an injustice is being done to importers, and are going to find out by whom, let the chips fall where they may.

POLICE BEAT THEM IN CELLS

The tragedy occurred at the home of her mother, Mrs. Frances Clew, Slater street. Temporary insanity is given as the cause of her death by Dr. Kennedy who was in attendance on her.

Derelicts Will Now Disappear

United States Government Building a Steamer Equipped to Blow Them up—These Dangers to Navigation Will be Removed.

NEW YORK, May 8.—The United States Government is building a steamer specially equipped to blow up derelicts. She will be the first craft of her kind to become part of the service, and when completed some time next year, the ability of the "watch dog" branch of the Treasury Department to cope with dangers and emergencies that now seriously strain the bureau will be largely increased. At present all the work that will fall to the new destroyer must be done by the revenue cutters which are neither built nor equipped for such service.

BIG MAJORITY FOR IRISH BILL

LONDON, May 8.—To prevent the first reading of the Irish Bill being delayed, and while Walter Hume Long was still speaking, Mr. Birrell moved the closure. Then, amid a great uproar and protest, and shouts of "Gas," the closure was carried by 417 votes to 121, and the Bill passed its first reading by 416 votes to 121. The House then adjourned.

TRAIN HELD UP IN MONTANA

BURR, MONT., May 9.—The North Coast Limited, the track train on the Northern Pacific Railway, has been held up at Welch's Spur, about fifteen miles east of here, and the engineer killed. The sheriff's office has just been informed of the robbery, and the officers are now preparing the scene. The object of the robbery, it is presumed, was to secure the contents of the through safe carrying consignments of the currency from Seattle, Portland and Spokane to eastern points. The bloodhounds of the penitentiary will be wired for.

PARIS IN NEED OF DICTATOR

PARIS, May 9.—The bogey of "the man on horseback" has been raised by Gaston Calmette, the well known editor of Le Figaro, who declares that France is on the road to ruin and in need of a strong man.

POOR THINGS ARE WILD WITH JOY

LONDON, May 10.—The Lord Mayor who has entered office scathingly criticized the frivolities of his predecessor in bestowing kisses broadcast when on an official visit to France, has succumbed to the attractions of the girls and women of Cornwall, of which country he is a native. Taking advantage of the annual festival in his native town of Salton, he is making a sort of triumphal tour of the country. It is not apparent that he went on kissing bent, but the first day an old woman among the admiring crowd requested a kiss and the lord mayor thought just one would not derogate from his dignity, especially as the recipient was aged. It was, however, the first step on the downward path, and he is now being swept along on a torrent of kisses, given and received by females of all ages until all the womankind in the neighborhood are delirious with joy.

Native Outbreak In India Likely

Every Thing Seems to Point to the Fact that there Will be Trouble in Lahore—Arrest of a Lawyer

LAHORE, British India, May 9.—Every thing seems to point to the imminence of a native outbreak here and the authorities are taking all the steps possible to suppress it by force of arms. The political unrest is hourly assuming graver proportions. Bands of stalwart ruffians armed with bludgeons, who have been enlisted by the leaders of the agitation are crowding into the native city, and troops of all arms and bodies of police are drafted into the city of Lahore from all parts of the province.

The fortifications of Lahore have been subjected to a special inspection and the artillerymen have been reinforced. The lieutenant governor of Punjab, Sir D. M. D. D. D., is taking active measures to circumvent any possible outbreak. He has issued a proclamation prohibiting meetings of every kind and solemnly warning the public not to attend any assemblies under pain of severe punishment. In addition the lieutenant governor has struck at the root of the revolutionary movement by causing the arrest this afternoon of a prominent lawyer, Lajpatral, who practiced in the chief court of the Punjab and who was the leader, financier and organizer of most of the seditious demonstrations and revolutionary riots in the Punjab.

Immediately after being taken in custody, Lajpatral was deported to another province. His arrest caused a profound sensation among the Hindus who hitherto had believed the authorities would not dare to take such drastic measures.

Another revolutionary leader, for whom arrest warrants have been issued, received an intimation of the action taken by the authorities, escaped from Lahore and is now in hiding.

CHARGED TRYING TO WRECK TRAIN

HALIFAX, N. S., May 10.—Charged with the serious crime of attempted train wrecking, Maybarn Moore, a 47-year old boy, was arrested by Detective Williams, chief of the Intercolonial railway police, and Special Railway Officer Purcell of Halifax. On the afternoon of the 20th of April spikes and a draw bar were placed on the rails near Mount Uniacke, a Dominion Atlantic accommodation came along at slow speed and the driver, noting the obstruction on the tracks, slowed the train up on the brink of a 21-foot embankment. Moore confessed to the officers that he had placed the articles on the rails just to see the train flatten them out. Concealed by the roadside he waited for an hour to see the train pass, but as one 7 1/2 to come he left the scene and proceeded to Halifax. He obtained employment here the same night and the following morning a member of the household read from a paper of the attempt to wreck the train. Moore at once fled from the city, and since then has remained concealed.

HAPPIEST MAN IN THE WORLD

NEW YORK, May 10.—Dressed in the conventional costume of the East Indies with gorgeous silken turban, the Mahatma, Aganaya Gaija Parakramaswami leader of the occult society known as the yellow Robe Ascetics of India, yesterday told of his hopes and aims in teaching the ignorant of this country. He arrived on Monday night and temporarily, at least, is a guest of Dr. Blackman, of No. 39 West Eighty-second street. How long the Mahatma will remain in this country is problematical.
