Canadiens Move Into Third Place With 4-3 Victory Over Chicago

MONTRÉAL, Nov. 7.—(CP)—A Montreal Canadiens edged the high-flying Chicago Black Hawks 4-3 here tonight in a fast but sometimes ragged game to move into third place in the National Hockey League standings, just one point behind the deadlocked Toronto Leafs and Boston Bruins.

Canadiens, bolstered by some new blood, were too much for the Hawks, who played in Chicago Wednesday night and made the long train hop here for tonight's game.

A crowd of 10,958 paid their way into the Forum to see last year's Stanley Cup-finalists in action.

Canadiens took a 1-0 lead in the first period when they scored forward Dick Irvin's man left, a squad of 16 for the first time in several games as wing Murph Chamberlain came back into the lineup. Blond Leo Gravelle, speedy forward from Montreal Royals' amateur squad, played head-up all the way and notched his first N.H.L. goal in the third period after a pair of rushes that were labelled.

Roger Leger, husky rearguard from Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League, also did himself proud in his first game, marking up a pair of assists.

Emer Lac, star centre of Montreal's big line, drew two penalties which is his usual quota for half a season, but sank two goals to make up for it. He had exactly half the penalties handed out, Kenny Reardon of Canadiens and Harry Dick of Hawks getting the others.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Nov. 7.—(CP)—For the third year in succession Woodstock Blake's today won the Maritime and Maine candlepin bowling championship and thus retained the Brunswick-Balke-Collender trophy.

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Know Your Hockey

—CONTINUED—

Rule 53.—Falling on Puck

(a) A minor penalty shall be imposed on a player who deliberately falls on or gathers the puck into his body by any means other than playing the puck with his stick to gain possession.

(b) This does not apply to a goalkeeper.

(c) No defending player, except the goalkeeper, will be permitted to fall on the puck, hold the puck or gather the puck into his body, when the puck is within the goal crease.

(d) For infringement of this rule, play shall immediately be stopped and a penalty shot shall be ordered against the offending team, but no other penalty shall be given.

DONORA, Pa., Nov. 7.—(AP)—Stan Musial credited himself with an error today for a "hot stove league" discussion of a price tag on future services with St. Louis Cardinals which would put him into baseball's top player-pay bracket.

The Pittsburgh Post-Gazette said Musial declared a report that he would seek \$100,000 for a three-year stint was not authorized by him but that he "intimated he would seek a sum in excess of \$30,000 a year."

The Sun-Telegraph's baseball writer, Charles J. (Chilly) Doyle said Musial "may become the National League's no. 1 holdout" and "was out for a long contract... and a big boost in pay."

Horsemen Are Reinstated; Purses Returned

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 7.—(AP)—Two prominent Maryland horsemen in an open letter to Governor Herbert O'Connor today demanded "an apology from some responsible official of the state" and told the executive "it is your duty to terminate the disgraceful and outrageous manner in which the affairs of the Maryland Racing Commission are being conducted."

The letter was signed by W. L. Brann of Glade Valley Farm, Frederick, and Sylvester W. Labrok Jr. of Hackett's Point Farm, Annapolis, whose trainers were suspended by the Racing Commission a year ago in connection with alleged horse "doping" cases at Pimlico.

It declared that Brann's trainer, Edward A. Christmas, and Clay Sulphur Labrok's trainer, as well as the owners, had "suffered under the false charges and reckless actions of your commission."

The letter was withheld until after the election, the horsemen said, "so as to make sure it could not be used for political purposes in Maryland." O'Connor was the Democratic candidate for the United States Senate, and had appointed George F. Mahoney chairman of the racing commission.

The commission later reinstated Christmas and Sulphur and returning the winning purses of the horses involved to Brann and Labrok.

Notre Dame Army Meet Saturday

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—(CP)—Betting commissioners forecast today that Saturday's Army-Notre Dame "game of games" in Yankee Stadium will attract the greatest single-game wagering flood in gridiron history.

Gamblers flush with the padded profits of wartime inflation will contribute to a turnover in excess of \$15,000,000, one price-layer predicted.

Manhattan's No. 1 "brokerage" estimated it will handle \$250,000 on the contest—viewed as a landmark in the national collegiate championships—in which a vengeance-seeking Notre Dame bids to break Army's 25-game undefeated skid, started in the 1944 season.

The agency usually handles about \$600,000 on an entire slate of Saturday games.

The giddy money-changing surprisingly cast Notre Dame in the role of slight favorites over the team which trampled them 50-0 in 1944 and 48-0 in 1945.

Notre Dame's favoritism, despite an unbroken record in five games this year, was surprising because of eve-of-the-battle injuries suffered by star quarterback Johnny Lujack, rated Coach Frank Leahy's most dangerous offensive weapon.

Kowcinak Unable To Accept Post

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 7.—(CP)—In a message received here tonight, Dick Kowcinak, a member of Hull Volants of the Quebec Senior Hockey League, said he was unable to accept the post of alternate on the puck club Millionaires, entered in the Cape Breton League.

Kowcinak who played here in 1941, said the Hull team declined to release him and explained that the club had gone to considerable trouble to arrange his quick transfer from professional to amateur ranks. He played last year with St. Louis of the American League.

"I hope the offer is open next year," he said.
