Roberts Moves Headquarters Eastward

CORDUA DIED BRAVELY

Gen. Carew and French After Botha East of Machadodorp.

CANADIANS ORDERED TO PRETORIA.

Col. Otter telegraphs from Johannesburg that his battalion reached Krugersdorp on the 22nd after three weeks marching and only 450 strong. They are ordered to Pretoria.

Macdonnell released the Krugersdorp Commandant.

DELARY COVERS DEWET'S RETREAT.

Delary appeared on Friday before Bank Station with a large force and summoned the garrison to surrender. The garrison refused.

Dewet took advantage of the ruse and crossed the River towards the Orange River Colony.

ROBERTS MOVES HIS HEADQUARTERS.

LONDON Aug. 25—(Special).—Lord Roberts has left Pretoria and fixed his headquarters at Wonderfontein, the second station west of Machadodorp where the bulk of the Boer army is supposed to be.

BULLER'S CAVALRY TRAPPED.

Gen. Buller reports that the Boers laid a trap for his cavalry on the 23rd, opening with several guns at fairly short range. The guns were silenced, but when pickets were being placed for the night two companies of Liverpool Regiment advanced into a hollow out of sight and were surrounded by the Boers.

BULLER'S SERIOUS LOSSES.

The Liverpool's Regiment lost ten men killed, Capt. Palmer and 55 wounded, 32 men missing.

CAREW AND FRENCH AFTER BOTHA.

Gen. Pole-Carew occupied Belfast near Machadodorp on the 24th, without opposition.

Gen. French with four brigades of cavalry is moving east of Machadodorp, cutting off retreat of Botha by the Delagoa Railway.

LIEUT. CORDUA MET DEATH BRAVELY.

A Pretoria special says: Lieut. Cordua, who was shot for plotting to kidnap Lord Roberts, walked fearlessly to the garden where the execution took place.

At his request he was not bound. He sat in a chair with folded arms and told Capt. Rarchard he was ready. Ten bullets entered his body.

The S. S. Elliot left at an early hour this morning for Summerside.

Private Jack Harris is expected in the city tonight from South Africa.

Prof. Robertson leaves today for Summerside. He will be accompanied by Mr. F. C. Hare of Ottawa. A chicken fattening station has been established at Alberton, another will probably be established in Mr. Stewart.

AS Messrs. E. McMillan and A. Ritchie, were taking refuge from the storm yesterday evening, at Mr. John Stewart's, Wiltshire Road, an alarm of fire was given by the family, that a barn about a mile south of Mr. Stewart's, was struck by lightning. The building was consumed in about an hour with a quantity of hay. It occurred about 6.30. One of the telephone posts on the east side adjoining North River bridge, was also leaning across the road.

THE Crusader excursion on the tug boat Saturday evening was a very pleasant affair. The weather was beautiful. After sailing out the harbor and up the West River and down past the city and back, the happy party landed at Poole's wharf at 5.30. Capt. McElhinney and other members of the S. A. Brass Band enlivened the proceedings with appropriate music. Singing and speaking were indulged in and closed with the National Anthem and three cheers for the Queen.
