## PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

MONDAY AFTERNOON.

House met at 4.30. The House resolved itself into committee of the whole with Mr. Arsenault in the chair on a bill to amend an act respecting the Legislature.

Hon. Mr. Peters said this bill was introduced some time ago but was killed owing to some mistakes in typewriting. The present is identical with the former bill in its intent. Mr. Morson, Mr. Fraser and Mr. Prowse condemned the act in principle and in its application. The clause was adopted on a party division.

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment, the Opposition dissenting. Bills to amend the Trustee Act, respecting the Charlottetown Condensed Milk Co. and the Partition Amendment Act were read a third time and passed.

The House resolved itself into committee of the whole on the bill to incorporate the Life Insurance Agents of Prince Edward Island.

Progress was reported at six o'clock and the House adjourned till the morning at ten o'clock.

TUESDAY FORENOON.

House met at 12.30 p.m. Mr. Mathison called the attention of the Government to a number of people outside the poor house who should be placed there.

Hon. Mr. Peters acknowledged that there was no means of compelling paupers to remain in the poor house.

Mr. Mathison suggested that an amendment to the poor law be made for the sake of controlling paupers. Hon. Mr. Cumiskey, answering the question asked last week, submitted plans and specifications of the Morell Bridge. The abutments and approaches had been constructed by day's work under the foremanship of John Quinn and the work will be completed this summer.

The bill incorporating the P. E. I. Tourist Association was reported of a private nature and set down for second reading to-morrow.

A bill amending an act respecting the legislature was read a third time and passed on party division.

The House resumed committee with Mr. Arsenault in the chair on the bill to incorporate the Life Assurance Companies of P. E. Island.

The speaker took the chair at one o'clock.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

House met at 4.30.

Hon. Mr. Peters called the attention of the House to a paragraph in the Guardian of the morning as follows: "OTTAWA, April 16 (Special)—A feeling is growing in Government circles here that the movement to send another delegation from P. E. Island regarding the Tunnel and another ice-breaking steamer is evidence that the Island Government is in financial distress and would cheerfully accept in lieu of the Tunnel a cash subsidy and that a compromise could be arranged on that basis. It is understood that private letters from the Island have suggested this."

He gave the most emphatic denial to such a statement. The government has no idea of accepting such money settlement of the Provincial claims. The House on both sides in caucus together have drafted a memorial pressing such claims as the Island has and neither party felt sure would relinquish such claims for any sum. What the intent of the telegram is can only be inferred. Such a thing as it alludes to was never mooted or heard of.

Mr. Mathison spoke with pleasure at hearing the denial of the Premier. The Opposition had intended bringing the matter before the government and they were glad to hear the Premier refuting such a statement as had been telegraphed from Ottawa. The Province will never consent to selling out the Provincial rights for any money consideration.

The House resumed committee with Mr. Arsenault in the chair on the bill to incorporate Life Insurance companies of P. E. I. The bill was reported agreed to with amendments including the changing of the fine from \$50 to \$20 for breach of bye laws and the providing that all bye laws enacted by the Association be subject to the approval of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Haszard the House resolved itself into committee of the whole with Mr. Smith in the chair on the bill to amend the jury amendment Act 1880. He explained that the bill was in order that a jury when five members agree on a verdict can report in one hour instead of four as in the past. The bill was reported agreed to and set down for third reading to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Haszard the House went into committee with Mr. Arsenault in the chair on the bill respecting Charlottetown waterworks. He explained that the bill was for the purpose of explaining the expropriation of two sections of land near the present pumping station. The Commissioners only use the land for laying the pipe line and never intended to further use the land. This was made clear by the present bill. The bill was reported agreed to.

The House adjourned at 5.55 till ten in the morning.
