EDITOR'S MAIL.

Dear Sir:-With reference to a letter recently published in your columns signed, Countryman, which deals with the Protection of our inland fisheries, I wish to add a few remarks on the common birds which are destructive to fish.

These birds which I will enumerate are, through the efforts of our Fish and Game Association completely protected, and year by year will become more plentiful and therefore more destructive to our fish.

The Great Blue Heron, familiarly known as the crane, is one of the most destructive. The Heron, says an English writer, is a great devourer of fish, and does more mischief in a river or pond than six Otters. People who have kept Herons, have had the curiosity to number the fish they fed them with, it has been found that one Heron will eat up fifty moderate sized trout in a single day.

The Loon is a fairly common bird in our waters, and lives entirely on fish. They are seldom killed, are averse from flying, and are but seldom seen on wing. They are never used for food as their flesh is rank and fishy.

Mergansers, shell ducks etc, and all sharp billed ducks are fishers, from the common habit in feeding entirely on fin and shell fish. Their flesh is held in little esteem, being lean and rancid, both smelling and tasting strongly of fish.

Kingfisher is another bird which feeds on fish and is very destructive to our small trout. One Kingfisher will kill thousands of small trout in a season. He is found in all our rivers and ponds. There he sits perched on an overhanging ledge glancing his piercing eye in every direction watching for his scaly prey, which, with a sudden plunge he sweeps from their native elements and swallows in an instant.

Gannet or Solan Goose. This is another bird which feeds entirely on fish and chiefly resorts to rivers where the fish are plentiful. From the corners of his mouth, as a narrow strip of black bare skin, which extends to the hind part of the head. Beneath this skin is another, that like the pouch of the Pelican, is detachable and of size sufficient to contain three whole mackerel, which in the breeding season, it carries at once to its mate or young.

Cormorants. This bird is the most destructive of all our fishers. They are seen in all our rivers carrying destruction to all the many tribes. They are most remarkably voracious, and have a most sudden digestion. Their appetite for fish is forever craving, and never satisfied. It fishes in fresh water as well as in the salt sea and preys not only by day time but by night.

Gulls, Herring Gulls, Saddle Back Gulls etc., are all very destructive to our fish.
