Lee Brewer Races In 2.07 3/4 In Winning Free For All Trot From Field Of Five

Showing outstanding trotting ability Lee Brewer, Milton Bell's big trotter expertly handled by Ike Moreside Saturday equalled the Charlottetown track trotting record of 2:07 3/4 when he came through with an upset victory over Watchin in the Free For All Trot, featured event on the closing day of the Goodwill Races. It was the biggest upset of the day of outstanding racing and marked the first time this year that the Halifax trotter, regarded as the best in the Maritimes had been headed in a summary. Going away on the rail in the first heat the Brewer horse, trotted into a big lead in the first half that Watchin couldn't overcome and Moreside rating his horse perfectly took him under the wire first for his record equalling performance. Again in the second heat Moreside opened up a big gap and again the other four horses in the field couldn't head him with the mile in 2:08 3/4. In the third and final heat Watchin and Brewer battled it out in a stretch duel with the former trotting by Lee in the stretch to cop the heat.

That was the highlight but a fair sized crowd of fans saw some of the best racing ever witnessed over the Charlottetown track. In almost every heat the horses would break out in bursts of speed in the stretch to come to the wire on a blank finish; fans would have to wait for the announcement before knowing the winner with the drivers themselves being very much in doubt as to the outcome. Two close races required extra heats as the result of the first heat being a draw. In the first heat, George Mac equalled the track record of 2:07 3/4 in a row and Saturday the weather was anything but good but the fans so keyed up were that they paid little heed to the cold wind and intermittent showers of rain during the afternoon.

In addition to Lee Brewer's victory in the free for all trot Sandy D came through with a four race victory in the 2:16 to 2:18 Trot and the Junior Free For All after losing the first heat; Bright Spot captured the 2:19 to 2:22 pace in straight heats while Eva Worthy with a similar record in the 2:23 to 2:26 pace.

As a matter of fact it was a story out of Washington last night that got us thinking about our Senators today. The despatch quoted Griffith as saying that he was very much afraid that, for the first time in all the years he has been in major league baseball - he was going to be connected with a tail-end team.

Seriously, though, if the Senators do finish last it will be mighty rude blow to Griffith. The enormity of the Nats' skid this season can only be understood by those who know how sure the silver-haired owner of the Washington Club was that his team would cop the flag.

Unfortunately the troubles of Griffith but to an even greater degree on his manager and one-time long-service third baseman, quiet self-effacing faithful Ossie Bluege.

Bluege was hailed as something of a miracle man last season when he took a team that had finished in seventh place in 1942 under Bucky Harris and piloted it into second place.
