Shoreham-By-Sea, Aug. 22, 1917.

My Dear Mother:—As this is Thursday night I thought I would drop you a few lines to let you know that I am in the best of health and getting along fine. The weather over here is lovely now, and more like summer than it has been any time during summer.

Well Dear Mother I've news to tell you that you certainly will not like to hear. I'm leaving for France tomorrow night with a draft from the 13th Reserve.

I like to go great and was one of the first to volunteer for active service. In leaving for the scene of action there is just one person I worry for and that is my dear mamma. Of course remember that I have my dear little brothers and sister at heart, but you especially mamma. I know you will find it hard, but when the call of duty comes a fellow must answer it. I know poor papa would be proud of me if he was living, so mamma you must look at it in the same light. Don't get it into your head that I am going over to be killed. I'm going to do my duty and if God wills I will be back to see you all again when the war is over. I will write to you mamma as soon as I get to France and let you know how I'm getting along.

Give my best regards to all inquiring friends and tell them that I'm in the best of spirits, going over to meet the Germans.

Well Dear Mamma I received a parcel of cake, tobacco and cigarettes from you, and many thanks, they were just lovely. I'm taking your picture with me and will carry them and those of the little boys over the battlefields and I will take them back home to you some day.

As soon as I get to France I will write to you.

### OLD GERMAN TOWNS

Dulmen and Havelberg Are in Prominence Again

The three German towns of Karlsruhe, Dulmen, and Havelberg are of special interest at present owing to the report that a number of citizens of the United States—passengers and crews of the steamers Voltaire, Mount Temple, Esmeralda, Georgic, Bulgarian, and Czeresk—are being held in these places as prisoners.

Neither Havelberg nor Dulmen is a town of any considerable size or commercial importance. The former is the more picturesque and interesting inasmuch as half of its 6,000 inhabitants reside on an island in the Havel River, a tributary of the Elbe, and the other half on the hills which rise from the right bank of the stream.

Crowning one of the hills is a beautiful old Romanesque cathedral which dates back to 1170 and which was restored during the last decade of the nineteenth century. The Havelberg bishopric was established long before the cathedral was built, however. It was created by Otto I during the first half of the tenth century.

Havelberg was once strongly fortified and suffered from siege bombardment, and capture on five occasions during the Thirty Years' War; it now has no military significance. It is situated on a short branch line which connects with the Hamburg-Berlin Railway and is 60 miles northwest of the capital and 115 miles south-east of the great city at the mouth of the Elbe. The inhabitants are engaged in tobacco manufacturing, sugar refining, and boat building. Dulmen is slightly larger than Havelberg, the most recent census giving it 7,500 inhabitants. It is situated some 18 miles southwest of Munster in Westphalia, between the Ems and the Rhine, and is 196 miles by rail southwest of Hamburg.

### CANADIAN PRIVATE INHERITS A FORTUNE

LONDON, Sept. 13.—Hon. Albert H. Platford, son of the late Lord De Platford, who during the last two years has been a private in the Canadian army and was wounded at Ypres in the left eye and shoulder, this week received news that he has been left a legacy of twenty-five thousand pounds. When seen, Pte. Platford, who possesses an extremely quiet and reserved disposition, was extremely courteous, but was quite naturally not inclined to talk of personal affairs for what assistance he could. She died newspaper publication. The inter-view took place in a busy reception room where many Canadian soldiers, with perhaps little wealth except an abundance of good spirits, were enjoying themselves rather noisily. Pte. Platford offered a cigarette from a case he had found in a boche dugout at Ypres. He consented eventually to give some particulars of his good fortune.

"It will come out in any case, I suppose," he remarked with a laugh, "and the papers are sure to exaggerate and publish all sorts of nonsense." Pte. Platford's father, who was secretary to the British Minister in China, was killed during the Boxer troubles fifteen years back. "This legacy comes to me from my uncle, Major Platford, my mother's brother, who was of the same family as my father. Major Platford offered a cigarette from a the Somme last year. I used to stay with my aunt and him a good deal before I went to Canada. My aunt, like others of the family, was a victim of rheumatism, and I naturally gave her what assistance I could. She died some years ago, but I understand now my uncle was grateful for my attention, and accordingly made the will in my favor."
