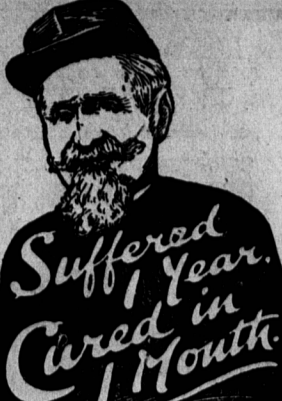

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over thirteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader: a good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C.M.G. Prince Edward Island is to be congratulated that it is to have an egg laying contest. Eggs are one of the big exports from the island. The contest will not only help to make it bigger but it will advertise us as an egg producing centre. It is to be hoped that our producers will take up most of the first twenty applications, twelve or fifteen at any rate. The rest can go to others for we always welcome visitors. Don't delay making your application until too late. It would be unfortunate if our own Island men did not have the bulk of the pens in the contest.

Remember the contest starts the first of November at the Experimental Station and the first twenty applications will be the only ones accepted. Write the Officer in charge, Experimental Farm, Charlottetown. For application blanks.

CHANGE IN TIMETABLE BETWEEN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND AND MAINLAND, SEPTEMBER 21, 1918

ISLANDER KILLED

Angus V. Campbell, employed at the Humboldt Pine Company's woods camp near Bayside, died at Trinity Hospital, Arcata, yesterday as the result of a peculiar accident, which happened Friday evening August 1 at the camp. While acting as helper for the blacksmith and striking with a 12-pound sledge on a loose handled tool, known as a fuller, he struck a glancing blow chipping off a piece of the battered head of the tool which struck him in the throat and embedded itself there, evidently an artery was cut, for he bled profusely. First aid was given him at Bayside and he was rushed to Trinity Hospital where he lingered until about 3 o'clock yesterday morning.

Deceased was a native of P. E. I., aged about 35 years and had been a resident of this city, a number of years. He is survived by his mother, two brothers and a sister in his old home, and a brother and a sister of this city. The funeral was held from the home of his sister, Mrs. John McCormack 3301 Prospect Ave., at 9.30 o'clock, A requiem high mass was said at St. Bernard's Catholic church and interment was at Buchopst cemetery. May his soul rest in peace.
