work, were very favorably commented upon. In the Art department there was keen competition, outside provinces having a large number of entries; but we were pleased to see that our own articles carried off the greatest number of prizes. The entries were larger than in previous years, and there was a noted improvement in the work. We believe that this section should be more interesting to our young people and should grow greater in the years to come.

The fruit exhibit was larger than in 1926, and many visitors from the Mainland expressed surprise at such a good display, considering that this province has not made any great effort in fruit growing. The other displays in the booths were attractive, and brought into competition the exhibits of Prince Edward Island. We mention particularly the display made by our merchants. These did credit to them and were the means of making the Building much more attractive to visitors. There was a marked improvement in the quality of the butter and cheese exhibits, which is natural, considering that our province is known as a "quality producer." Our seed and table potatoes, butter, cheese, eggs, bacon, etc., being known wherever these products are used. Let us ever keep in mind that Prince Edward Island stands for Products, Excellence, Incomparable. Our thanks are due to the Minister of Agriculture, the Dominion Livestock Commissioner, the Provincial Government, the City Council, our Merchants and others, who kindly offered special prizes, also to the Manager and clerks of the Bank of Commerce, to the Press for their excellent support, and to all others who assisted in making the 1927 Exhibition the great success it was.

And now we come to another side of the picture, and that is that our Exhibition is faced with a certain amount of financial difficulties. We are staging one of the finest Provincial Exhibitions in Canada, and doing so as a private company. The grants we receive are just about sufficient to pay the prize money and Judges' expenses. The tremendous cost of upkeep of a plant like ours, carrying on this expenditure has been nearly \$100,000—the printing of clerical help, feed, advertising, light, attractions and all the other incidentals which make up an Exhibition have to be financed by the receipts. In all other provinces the Exhibitions are conducted by the provinces, and all deficits are made up or guaranteed by them. The shareholders of this Association, we fear, have done more than their share; and that, we regretfully say, is due to appreciation from the public in carrying on this exhibition year after year. Since 1908 when the grounds were built the shareholders have received an average dividend of 1 per cent. The past few years they have received no dividends whatever. On the contrary they have had to face the extinction of the reserve built up for emergencies, and to pledge themselves to the Bank for large overdrafts. This we believe is not fair, and we are satisfied that when the public of this province knows the facts they will have a different feeling towards those who are conducting this Exhibition, and that as a result, greater sympathy and support can be expected from the Government, the City Council and all who have at heart the welfare of this fair province.

We may mention here that our directors whose names are appended have given freely of their time to the affairs of this Association, and none of them have received the slightest remuneration, they have acted wholly and solely for the good of the province. We hope and trust that as a result of our interviews with the Minister of Agriculture presenting the Government of Prince Edward Island, and with the Mayor and City Council of the city of Charlottetown, that a new era of progress will result, and that the Exhibition of 1928 and future years will grow greater and greater. We solicit the goodwill and hearty support of the Press. We realize the great part they play in moulding public opinion, and we are thankful for the support they have given us in the past, practically free of charge. They have done their part well and no criticism, but only praise can be bestowed.

And now we come to a sad part of this report. We refer to the death of our beloved Secretary and shareholder, Charles R. Smallwood, who successfully piloted the affairs of this Association for upwards of twenty-eight years. To Mr. Smallwood more than any one man, the success of the Provincial Exhibition is due. It was his hobby and his life work and he gave unstintingly of his time and energies to make it a success. Even last fall when suffering severely and on the advice of his physician ordered to rest in bed, he disobeyed and carried out his duties, though suffering extreme pain, during the Exhibition. To his bereaved widow, Mrs. Smallwood and son, Vivian, we extend our deepest sympathy.
