GREATEST CAMPAIGN IN FIVE GENERATIONS

Now Engaged the British Electors. Every Seat to be Contested. Monster Demonstration Defies the Lords. Strong Language by Free Church Leader and Others.

Special to The Guardian. LONDON, Dec 5—Britain is now immersed in the greatest political campaign in generations. The conflict between the two Houses is being made the dominant issue of the struggle, other questions being temporarily brushed aside. On Saturday the Radicals held a monster demonstration in Trafalgar Square where twenty thousand artisans and laborers cheered in defiance of the House of Lords.

The Suffragettes, after comparative quiet, have again engaged in efforts to disturb meetings. Confrontations are to take place in every constituency excepting Birmingham, where Chamberlain sits, and the seat held by Speaker Lowther. Winston Churchill in a speech declared that brute force and class hatred, instead of public spirit and forbearance, are becoming British characteristics. Harcourt compared the issues with those of Cromwell and the French

Revolution. Lord Liveden designated the Peers "rebels against the Crown." Dr Clifford the revered leader of the Free Church, hoped the Peers would perish like Pharaoh in the Red Sea. Byles declared the British People are now preparing to strangle the Peers and are ready for civil war. A favorite campaign emblem is a turban, carved to represent an imbecile face stuck on a pole, surmounted by a coronet and bearing the words, "The First Born."

GOMPERS PLEDGES LABOR SUPPORT

To the Efforts of Switchmen In the Union Strike at St. Paul, Minn.

PAUL, December 5—President Hawley of the Switchmen's Union declares that should the railroad managers insist on crushing the strike by employing non-union men, a general strike of all railroad employees as well may be called. Gompers has pledged the support of the Federation of Labor.

MUCH DAMAGE BY THE STORMS

Great Loss of Life and Property is Reported From British Islands and Canadian Coasts.

Special to The Guardian. LONDON, December 5—The storm which continued unabated on Saturday did immense damage to the shipping and involved heavy loss of life. The steamer Ellen Vermin, from the Isle of Man for Liverpool, foundered suddenly with twelve passengers and twenty-one of a crew. Ten survivors from the steamer Thistlemoor were picked up in an open boat, but one died from exposure. The steamer Vegesax foundered with all on board near the Mouth of the River Elbe. A lifeboat was found containing four men, a woman and child frozen to death. It is feared many others disasters

have occurred. ST. JOHN'S, N. F. December 5—What the oldest residents declared has been Newfoundland's greatest storm has passed, leaving scores of fine vessels broken and battered wrecks along the rocky shores. The entire western coast is littered with the wreckage from unnumbered and of ten unknown schooners which were dashed on the rocks by the tempests. Every effort is being made to extend assistance toward the distressed seamen. Enormous damage has been done to the fishing gear, telegraphic service is interrupted and other losses sustained. The steamer Portia arrived here after a dangerous passage.

CIVIL WAR ON IN NICARAGUA

An Engagement is Expected to Take Place Shortly—Zelaya Entrenched.

BLUEFIELDS, December 5—A crucial engagement between the joint insurgent forces under Generals Ojejo and Estrada on the one side and Zelaya's army on the other is expected before Wednesday. Zelaya is now entrenched at Rama in a strongly protected position, but a victory for insurgents is predicted.

WILD BLIZZARD IN WESTERN STATES

BUTTE, Mont. Dec 4.—One of the worst blizzards of the season is raging over Eastern Montana and Northern Wyoming. Wyoming stockmen fear losses. At Matinee and Sheridan, Wyo, 500 citizens had to be escorted home by policemen to prevent their being lost in the storm.

TRAINMAN GIVES LIFE TO SAVE WOMAN

CHICAGO, Dec 4.—Dennis Kelley, a fireman of the Northwest Railway, as Kenosha, gave his life yesterday to save a woman who was standing bewildered on the track before an approaching train. The flagman shouted to the woman and when she failed to step out of danger he leaped forward and threw her to one side. As he did so he lost his balance and was unable to jump from the path of the train. His body was thrown forty feet and when the police arrived, the woman was standing over it, weeping bitterly.

SOUVENIR CHAIR PRESIDENT W. H. TAFT

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich Dec 4.—President Taft is to have a new chair which is being made in one of the Grand Rapids furniture factories. It is a souvenir of the trip he made as secretary of war to Japan. THE DUNK RIVER FARMERS' INSTITUTE

SUMMERSIDE, December 4.—The Eighth Annual Meeting of the Dunk River Farmers' Institute was held on the evening of the 29th in the Lower Freetown hall, and was well attended. Joseph A. Taylor, the President presided. After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting of the Annual Meeting held on Dec. 13th. The president gave a brief report. Agnew, Wilford, Michael Mulligan, West Newton; Frank Montgomery, Lower Bedouque; Master Ralph Schurman, Lower Freetown; was elected as the Institutes choice, for the short course at Truro. The exact amount to be given to the Seed Fair is to be decided at the next meeting. The directors were instructed to carry on the suit now in the County Court for the recovery of an amount due the Institute. Meetings are to be held during the next twelve months at Central, North and Lower Bedouque, West Newton, Wilford, Centerville, and Freetown. A resolution was passed directing the officers to tender to James Carruthers, Past president, a resolution of condolence re the death of his daughter. A vote of thanks was tendered to Mr Taylor the retiring president for the interest he had taken in the work of the Institute to which he briefly replied.

HON MR BRODEUR ON CANADA'S NAVY

MONTREAL, Dec 4.—At the annual banquet tonight of the Montreal branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association some notable speeches were made. Hon. L. P. Brodeur, the minister of marine and fisheries, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy and R. L. Borden, replying to the toast of the Dominion. Mr Brodeur, in referring to the naval question, said that Canada should have a navy to protect her trade routes, and defend her coasts. Mr Brodeur pointed out that other countries much smaller than Canada had navies and he had no doubt that Canada would do her duty. Mr Brodeur added: "We are about to begin the construction of a navy and I know that Canada is prepared to take her place and do her share of contributing to the defence of the Empire. "It is the first duty of parliament to protect the trade of the country. I believe the government is following out the sentiment of our people in constructing our navy." Mr Brodeur continued by declaring that in any defence of the empire he knew Quebec would not be behind. R. L. Borden, the Conservative leader, said he thought there was no real difference among the people regarding their duty to the Empire and he was convinced if war should come all classes of Canadians would rally to the national defence. Mr Borden concluded that as war comes with unexpected suddenness steps should be taken to be in readiness for it. Sir Thomas advised the manufacturers of the wadding, growth of railways in the Dominion, an instance of which was that while the C. P. CHATHAM, Ont., December 4.—Tom Longboat was victorious in his five mile race with Billy Sherring in the Armourees, winning out by two laps in a very exciting race. Longboat was in good shape, while Sherring showed lack of training. A large crowd of spectators witnessed the race. The time was a little over 25 minutes. Longboat took several spurts, while Sherring kept the same pace all through the race. The race was preceded by a five mile run, open to amateurs. Leyden, of Northwood, and Higley, of Chatham, the other starters both dropped out during the race.

KING'S BUSINESS SHOWS RESULTS

That the work of the King's Business Evangelistic Campaign recently conducted in this city, was fruitful was plainly evidenced yesterday at two of the City Churches, viz, the First Methodist and Grace Church. In these two places of worship the pastors have been kept busy since the departure of Dr Elliot and his supporters in looking after those who had signified their desire, by card or otherwise, to lead a new and better Christian life, and to join a church of their selection. Yesterday Rev H. E. Thomas extended the Right Hand of Fellowship to nearly one hundred applicants for membership into the First Methodist Church—over forty in the morning and about sixty in the evening. A crowd of spectators witnessed the service at the close of Reception Service at which a great number of members, old and new, participated. In the services at the Grace Church yesterday fifty new members were admitted to the Church, fifty by card and ten by letter—all after a sincere series of preparatory services. These preparations are being continued through this week in Zion and St James Churches and later on their candidates will be made members of the respective Churches to which they have applied for membership. Dr Elliott's Mission has certainly aroused a religious spirit in Charlottetown conducive to grand results.

NEW GOVERNOR OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

OTTAWA, Dec 4.—Thomas W. Patterson of Victoria, has been appointed lieutenant-governor of British Columbia in succession to Governor Dunsmuir, whose resignation has been accepted. Mr Dunsmuir was appointed in 1908 and though his time has not expired, he has been anxious for some time to lay down the honors of office, and has intimated that his resignation would be available at any time. Mr Patterson, the new governor, is a prominent as a railroad builder and has resided there since 1885. He has one of Victoria's leading citizens and is respected on the Pacific coast as a solid and successful man. He is a native of Ayrshire, Scotland, having been born there fifty-seven years ago. During his younger days he lived in Ontario, having been educated in Oxford county. He was returned from Victoria to the British Columbia legislature in 1902 in a by-election, and in the general election following.

RAILROADMEN DECLARE SWITCHMEN ARE BEATEN

ST. PAUL, Minn., Dec 4.—Chief John J. O'Connor of the police department practically admitted that he considered the strike situation serious yesterday when the issued orders requiring all members of his day force to stay on duty at the Central Station until ten thirty in the evening. The order went into effect last night and will continue until all danger of a clash between the strikers and the strike breakers is ended. Several conferences between the Chief and officials of the railroad were held yesterday. According to the railroad officials, the beginning of the end of the switchmen's strike is in sight. One prominent official who has been active in the strike says that the railroads were handling thirty per cent of all business offered.

WOMAN WITH THE SERPENT'S TONGUE

NEW YORK, Dec 4.—William Watson, the English poet, who arrived here today, made the following signed statement regarding the authorship of his poem, "The Woman With the Serpent's Tongue." "The Woman With the Serpent's Tongue" is a composite photograph of Mrs Asquith and her step-daughter Violet. The poem is a portrait of the physical characteristics of Mrs Asquith. The latter is the voice of the family and rules them all. "Violet is the real official voice speaking with authority. She it is, who slights the worthiest in the land—snears at the just, condemns the brave—and blackens goodness in its grave." Mr Watson arrived on the Lusitania with his wife for a short visit in this country. Mr Watson, at the same time he made his statement, gave an account of a visit he made in June last, to Mrs Asquith, wife of the British premier, and her step-daughter, on whose personalities he says in his statement he based his poem. This account he prepared soon afterward to explain the circumstances under which the poem was written and the incidents which inspired it.

\$1,000 FIRE IN CALAIS

CALAIS, Me., Dec 4.—The ell of Robert J. Walker's dwelling was destroyed by fire early this morning. The loss is estimated at \$1,000, insured. The family were aroused by a neighbor who discovered the fire, but they had a narrow escape from suffocation.

RAILROAD BUILDING IN THE DOMINION

WINNIPEG, Man Dec 4.—According to an official report, the railways have spent this year in constructing work in western Canada \$28,000,000, and in supplies and materials \$20,000,000. Next years estimates of the three leading railways provide for an expenditure of \$75,000,000.

RANCE INCREASES MAXIMUM DUTIES

THE PATRIOT "SQUIRMS" AGAIN

The Guardian requests the entire staff, or as many thereof as they can call at this office any or every day except Sundays and statutory holidays, and examine the Guardian's circulation books, also press and mail rooms, and hereby challenges The Patriot to extend the same courtesy to The Guardian. As The Patriot knows it is true that The Guardian's daily circulation is never less than 7000 copies and that The Guardian's average daily circulation is always over 7000 copies it does not attempt to prove otherwise, and thus cannot secure \$200 for the two hospitals, although The Guardian agrees to give it all possible assistance in doing so. It has also not accepted The Guardian's challenge to print in its columns the exact number of papers it issues regularly as well as its regular daily circulation, or to prove that the regular combined circulation of all other P. E. I. daily newspapers, including that of the semi-weekly Patriot, is as great as the regular daily circulation of The Guardian. The reason is of course plain that it cannot submit proofs which will secure the money, and dare not accept the challenge. The Patriot knows that all of The Guardian's Rural Dailies are mailed daily in time to catch all afternoon mails, which is not even the case with that paper, and furthermore

of its subscribers who have a daily mail, (and the bulk of the people receive their mail daily) and all others as frequently as they have a mail, just as do the subscribers of The Guardian Daily Patriot, and The Guardian challenges The Patriot to prove otherwise. The Patriot knows when it refers to The Guardian as mailing its Rural Daily to each subscriber in bundles of two or three tied together and thus semi-weekly or tri-weekly that it insinuates a falsehood which The Guardian challenges it to prove, or otherwise retract. It does not make itself clear on this point as on several others, but the above is apparently what it means. It will be well for Postmaster Wheeler to take notice of the Patriot's apparent hint that the Rural Daily is not mailed daily as printed but two or three together and thus in violation of the Postal laws, thus in violation of the scheme of multiplying the Patriot's circulation by six and calling it a daily circulation may give the public an idea of how it manages to claim even as small a circulation as it does, but is too silly and contemptuous to be noticed further by any reputable journal or citizen. The Guardian will wait patiently for The Patriot to accept its challenge and to print its regular average daily circulation as well as its regular circulation.
