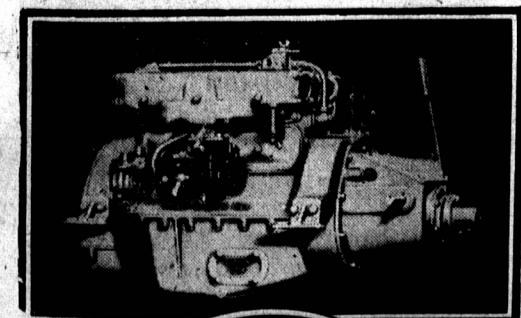

Luzon & Co. Before Court

NAPANEE, Ont., October 29 — Ulysses Luzon, 23, Walter Koresky, 25, and Joseph Pelletier, 19, all of Windsor, Ont., expected to plead one way or the other to three charges of armed bank robberies and another of jail breaking, when they appeared before county Magistrate James Garvin here this afternoon, obtained a fourth remand on the grounds that they were not ready to enter a plea.

They Seem Nonchalant

Luzon and Koresky strode nonchalantly into the prisoner's dock shortly after two o'clock before a large and curious court attendance. Awaiting the arrival of Magistrate Garvin they chatted casually with their guards, looked around at the crowd and newspapermen and grinned at one another.

They were all three remanded to appear before Magistrate Garvin in Kingston, Ont., on November 1, at 11.15. The Magistrate stated he would at that time hear if the trio was ready to enter a plea and if that was the case, the hearing would take place at two o'clock the same afternoon.

The court first read the charges to Luzon and Koresky previous to the arrival of Pelletier, in whose case the Crown is to proceed separately. The charges include the biggest bank robbery in the annals of Canadian crime, at nearby, Bath, Ont. last Aug. 20 when the trio allegedly entered a branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, with revolvers and escaped with \$300,000 in bonds and securities as well as \$11,000 in cash. The other two robberies were allegedly perpetrated in Port Perry and Ayr. The loot in Ayr was \$75,311. A lesser amount was netted in the Port Perry robbery last July 19. Other charges were jail breaking from the Waterloo county jail in Kitchener, auto theft and theft of licence plates.

Lauson Outspoken
 The accused rose together to hear the accusations but Lauson spoke. "We ask for another remand," he said. The court replied there would have to be a good reason and called upon defence counsel Harry A. McNeil to explain. The defence attorney told the court he was ready to proceed. When Luzon heard this he stated that he knew other charges could be lodged and that he wished to obtain counsel from J.S. Allan, Windsor lawyer.

Lauson demanded that these charges be read to him, to Koresky and to Pelletier. The Magistrate acquiesced, requesting Crown Attorney K. S. Ham, to read charges.

Orders to bring in Pelletier halted proceedings for some 15 minutes. It was a hushed audience that heard hefty provincial police constables and hospital attendants clambering up the circular stairs of the local courthouse, bearing the four-wheeled stretcher on which lay Pelletier.

As the stretcher rolled smoothly into the court, spectators silently stared at the youth who was shot in Montreal last August 31 by Hulton Langshaw, a constable in an uptown branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, when the accused attempted to cash \$6,000 worth of stolen bonds.

Pale and thin but almost smiling, Pelletier rolled his head from side to side curiously. When the stretcher approached the prisoner's dock, Pelletier spotted his two friends. It was the only time since the two men who attempted to shoot their way out of a 10 miles outside Charlotte-town P.E.I., on September 12, showed any sign of emotion. They turned about to say a few words of encouragement to the paralyzed youth. Pelletier returned their gesture with a broad grin that exposed two gold-capped teeth.

Crown Attorney Ham then read the charges against the trio. Magistrate Garvin addressed Pelletier. "You two companions have asked for a remand, do you wish to make the same request?" "All right," answered Pelletier.

Shortly before the accused were escorted back to cells pending their hearing in Kingston a week from now, Pelletier asked his guards to turn the stretcher toward Luzon and Koresky.

The three chatted together for a few minutes. When police tagged at the handcuffs on Luzon and Koresky, Luzon waved with one hand. "So long kid, cheer up."

As the elder two of the accused walked away to police cars, hospital attendants carefully tucked in Pelletier and rolled him out of the court.

Meanwhile it was learned that Luzon's 20-year-old wife was in a Kingston hospital awaiting her baby. Luzon himself said he did not know where she was. Expecting to proceed with the hearing, police officers headed by Inspector W. F. Scamedy, in-vestigation branch Toronto, had brought all the evidence and exhibits with them.

Defence Counsel MacNeil said he had understood the accused were going to enter a plea, and added he could not understand why they had changed their minds at the last minute.
