Larrupers And Devon Resume Series

LIVERPOOL, N.S., Sept. 23—(CP)—Liverpool Larrupers and Devon, Senior Baseball Champions of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, will resume their series for the Maritime crown.

After two games in New Brunswick, the teams were tied with a home game as they came to the home town of the 1939 titlists for the remainder of the best-in-five series. Liverpool won the opener at Fredericton and dropped the second.

The New Brunswickers were expected to bank on Lefty Neil for their pitching tomorrow. He hurled in the opening game. Likely starter for Larrupers was Gordon (Schoolboy) Hirtle, a consistent winner in the playdowns, who has not yet appeared in the Maritime final.

Second game here will be played Wednesday the third, if necessary, Thursday.

The games will start at 4:00 p.m. A.D.T.

Reds Split With Pirates

NEW YORK, Sept. 23—(AP)—Johnny Vander Meer's winless streak ended today as the Cincinnati Reds split with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Reds won the opener, 2-1, at Pittsburgh.

Vander Meer walked seven batters and hit one with a pitched ball in four innings and was relieved in the fifth by Milburn Griffith. The Pirates nipped both pitchers for eight hits.

The first-game victory was the 38th the Reds have won this season by a one-run margin.

At Brooklyn the Dodgers put on their own celebration of old-times day at Ebbets Field as they twice defeated the Phillies 10-2 and 5-2.

Freddy Fitzsimmons, 39, was the hero of the day. He held the Phillies to four hits in the opening game and hurled his 16th victory of the year. He has lost only twice.

At Chicago St. Louis Cards blasted the faint first-division hopes of the Cubs, sweeping both ends of a doubleheader 8-1 and 2-1.

At Boston, the Bees and New York Giants split their last engagements of the season. The home series between Carl Hubbell, 4-3 in the opener and taking a 7-3 beating in the closing contest.

On Saturday Cincinnati Reds split a doubleheader with Pittsburgh Pirates, dropping the opening game 8-7 in the 10th after sweeping the opener 8-1.

New York Giants broke the longest losing streak of the season at 11 games by whipping Boston Bees 3-1. The slumped Brooklyn Dodgers dropped a 4-2 decision to Philadelphia, while Chicago tossed out St. Louis 4-3.

Reds Count On Pitching

NEW YORK, Sept. 23—(AP)—Without knowing who their foe will be in the World Series next week, Cincinnati Reds of the National League will be counting heavily on an advantage in pitching.

It's about the only hope any representative of the senior circuit can carry into baseball's big classic and it has failed for five consecutive years.

The Reds have the same staff they had last fall, plus Jim Turner and Joe Begg. They will be facing Bob Feller, Mel Harder and Al Milar of Cleveland Indians or Buck Newson, Schoolboy Rowe and Tommy Bridges of Detroit Tigers.

If Cleveland make the grade, Feller will fire first and nobody, not even Paul Derringer, has any advantage over the Van Meter, Ia. farm boy. Likewise, you have to go into the fine points of pitching to give anyone an edge over Newson, because "Bobo" has a better percentage than any series stalwart except Rowe.

Derringer led off against the Yankees last year and lost a 2-1 struggle in the ninth inning. His record this season, 20 games won and 12 lost, is as flashy as last year but Manager Bill McKechnie says he has been pitching better ball. Bucky Walters has won 21 and lost nine. He probably will be in the No. 2 slot again.

McKechnie also has worthy starters in Gene Thompson and Jim Turner. Thompson has speed and Turner control and between them they have won 28 games while losing 16.

But the principal margin Cincinnati sees for its staff is in its relief. Joe Begg, a pick-me-up from the Yankee system, has won nine straight games in a rescue role.

News Briefs

TORONTO, Sept. 23—(CP)—Aired Noyes, distinguished English poet, said today the Nazi sinking of the British evacuee ship last week was a "heinous crime, not merely a war disaster... it is plain criminal murder."

NEW YORK, Sept. 23—(CP)—The torpedoing of a British liner in mid-Atlantic with the loss of 206 grown-ups and 87 children being evacuated to Canada, shows "there is no limit on Nazi frightfulness," the New York Sun said today.

LONDON, Sept. 23—(CP Cable)—Evacuation of children from vulnerable areas of the embattled United Kingdom will proceed pending completion of a study of the circumstances surrounding the Nazi torpedoing of a mercy ship with a loss of 283 lives, 87 of them youngsters for Canada.

TORONTO, Sept. 23—(CP)—Commenting on the tragic sinking of a child refugee ship by a German torpedo, Navy Minister Angus L. Macdonald told interviewers: "We'll pay them back in due time."

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23—(AP)—Sinking of the British liner by a German submarine with a loss of 87 children and 206 others was condemned in a resolution today by the Philadelphia Methodist Ministers' conference.

HAMILTON, Sept. 23—(CP)—Rev. William H. King lost his life last week when a Nazi submarine sank a British liner which was carrying child refugees from Great Britain to Canada. It was learned here today. Mr. King was acting as chaplain for the children.

STRATFORD, Ont., Sept. 23—(CP)—Roger Poole, 12-year-old English boy who was coming here to stay at the home of Rev. and Mrs. G. W. Schoedel here, was lost when a British evacuee ship was sunk by a Nazi submarine last week. The boy became "acquainted" with the Schoedel family through Walter Schoedel, 14, when the boys exchanged letters several years ago.

CALGARY, Sept. 23—(CP)—Maurice Groberman, 25, is believed to have lost his life in the sinking of the liner carrying evacuee children to America, according to word received here today by his father, Charles Groberman, saying that his son's name appears in the passenger list of the sunken liner, and is "missing, presumed to be lost."

WINNIPEG, Sept. 23—(CP)—Gloom spread over a group of 28 excited British children evacuated to Canada here today when one of them picked up a newspaper telling of the death of 87 children like themselves in the torpedoing of their ship.

"Will this stop other children from coming over here?" a newspaperman asked.

"No fear!" a square-chinned lad replied. "Jerry can't frighten us."

Chinese Press Attacks French

CHUNGKING, Sept. 23—(AP)—The Chinese press bitterly denounced the French today for agreeing to "limited" Japanese military occupation of Indo-China but there was no indication China would carry out a recent threat to march into the French colony as a counter-move.

The newspaper described the agreement as representing "maximum French concessions without compensating features," and branded Japan's guarantee of Indo-China's territorial integrity as "utterly worthless."

Chinese military observers said the new Japanese venture should be regarded as just another troop movement with no decisive influence on the Japanese-Chinese war. The belief prevailed here that the Japanese would not attempt to invade China across her southern Yunnan Province border, but rather would use their new air bases in the French outposts to bomb Kunming, important Chinese military centre, and other Yunnan centres.

SAYS WILKIE LOSING GROUND

NEW YORK, Sept. 23—(AP)—Edward J. Flynn, Democratic national chairman, said today that President Roosevelt shares his view that Wendell Wilkie "has lost ground" in his campaign for the presidency. Furthermore, added Flynn, the president has said he had every reason to be satisfied with the progress of the Democratic campaign. Flynn conferred with the president Friday.

Pirates Stop Win Streak

NEW YORK, Sept. 23—(AP)—The Pirates stopped Joe Begg's nine-game relief winning streak at Pittsburgh today and won their first series from the champion Cincinnati Reds by taking the odd game 12-9 in the wintup of the season at Forbes Field.

After the Reds shelved Joe Bowman from the mound in the first inning with a four-run rally, the Pirates came back in the third and sent Paul Derringer to the show-ers by scoring five runs with the aid of a pair of errors and a walk.

At Brooklyn Dolph Camilli blasted his 23rd home run in the ninth inning and brought Dodgers a 3-2 victory over New York Giants.

At Chicago Claude Passeau, veteran right-hander, turned in his 20th victory for the Cubs limiting.

Refreshed by 10 hours' sleep, he and Trainer Max (Lefty) Weisman descended on the deserted Cleveland Stadium. Feller chased balls. He dashed over the infield and rambled over the outfield.

"Do I look tired?" Feller asked later, stretched out on the rubbing table. "Do I look underweight?"

He didn't look like a pitcher who had pitched 27 innings in eight days with a disastrous three-batter relief tour thrown in for good measure. He weighed 183 pounds, a little below his "normal."

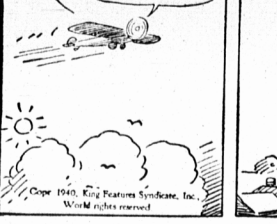

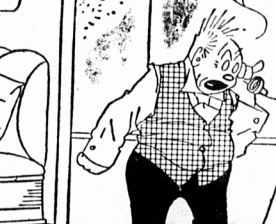
