Down The Back Stretch

St. John race track, built by the company on the site of the old track at Coldbrook a few miles out of St. John, at a cost of about \$100,000 on which two race meetings were held in 1930, has been sold at auction to satisfy creditors and brought the sum of \$5,000. It was purchased by Hugh McLean, whose father was quite heavily interested in the enterprise. The track was built on a rather bad location, hence the large sum expended in its construction. The grandstand was a wonderful piece of workmanship capable of seating over 6,000 people.

A letter has been received from Peter J. Conroy by a friend in this city and from its tone one is led to believe that he has not entirely forgotten his former haunts. He is at present engaged in working Rosemary 2:17, formerly owned by Fred Ross of this city, Orto Manor, 2:08 1-2, a green trotter, and Don Vernon 2:05 1-2. This is a pacer trained by Vic Fleming last year who put that tab on him at Lexington. He is eligible to the glow classes. There are only eleven horses training at Woodstock and three at Houlton, Maine, so far. The reliable, John Willard, has been heard at Presque Isle.

We Douse, formerly of Charlotte, who has made good with so many erratic horses and others not erratic, is this year training for Tom Kelly at Bangor, Maine. Kelly has had more good horses than any owner we know of in recent years.

Tyndie Semple has his track in the order in Kensington and is keeping some. For instance that good trotter Chestnut Dillon, owned by Chester Pratt, St. Peters, has been a mile in 2:20 with the last half in 1:05 and the last quarter in thirty one seconds, serving notice on all fast class trotters that he is ready to take them into camp. Notice Guy, a three year old by Bud Axworthy is a mighty likely prospect at the pace and is owned by Sadsbury and Semple and has been in 2:30 with the last quarter in 1:04 seconds. Another good three year old is Joe Jochimien by Bud Axworthy. This lad has been in 2:35 with the last quarter in 35 seconds. His owner carries the same opinion. The fourth that makes up his racing stable is a green pacer owned by R. Hardy of Alberton. This chap is by DeChato of an Aubrey dam and shows well. In addition to the above Tyndie will no doubt have several others to train before the summer is over.

June 15th is the date of the Matinee Races at New Annan. We wonder if this meeting will uncover another Jacqueline 2:10. It will be remembered that at the matinee races of 1930 Jacqueline showed up particularly well and was at one purchased for \$800. Her subsequent career is well known.

The greatest mothers, The American Horse Breeder in a recent issue carries statistics of the greatest brood mares known to the breeding sport. Those credited with being the dam of eight 2:10 trotters are four in number. Honeymoon H. 2:09 3-4, Emily Ellen, 2:09 1-4, Miss Pierette 2:09 3/4, Mary Tipton 2:14 1-4.

The Senator, 2:03 1-2, one of the greatest Futurity winners in the United States and a successful sire of early and extreme speed, died at Laurel Hall Farm, Indianapolis recently.

The first two year old trotter to secure a record of 2:10 in 1932 is by Guy McKinney 1:59 1-4.

CHICAGO LOSE NAT. LEAGUE LEADERSHIP

Dodgers Take Turbulent Game From Cubs, While Braves Grab Top of Heap.

NEW YORK, June 10.—The Chicago Cubs lost first place in the National League at Brooklyn today as they dropped a turbulent ball game to Brooklyn by a 4 to 3 count and fell a half game behind the Boston Braves.

Hollis Thurston pitched six hit ball for the Dodgers while the clubbing of Joe Stripp, Tony Cucinello and Clyde Sukeforth bested Burleigh Grimes. Brooklyn took the series 3-1.

The Phils split even with Pittsburgh in their four game series at Philadelphia by taking the final encounter from the Pirates, 6 to 5. Although outbatted 15 to 11, the Phils bunched their hits for the triumph. Paul Waner hit a home run in the seventh inning with L. Waner and Grace on the bases. That put the Pirates ahead 5 to 4, but the Phils tied the count in their half by doubles by Hurst and Whitney and added another run in the eighth when Bartell drove George Davis home with a two bagger.

Poor support robbed Red Lucas of a victory here and the Giants scored four unearned runs in the sixth and seventh innings to make it four straight against Cincinnati, 4 to 3.

It was Lucas' 12th complete game, his fifth defeat and the ninth straight loss for the Reds. Ed Brandt, Boston's left-handed hurling ace, turned back the Cardinals at Boston, 2 to 1, to give the Braves the last game of the three-game series. St. Louis stepped out in front in the second inning when Bladen singled, moved to second when Orsatti was hit by a pitched ball and scored on Gelbert's single.

The Roger Rourke disburial at Greenfield, Mass., brought together a large turnout of horsemen. The highest price realized was \$330. This probably marks the passing from active participation in a big way as a horse salesman of Mr. Rourke.

The recent auction at Indianapolis, Ind., was well attended by horsemen. The highest price was secured for a two year old trotter Senator Hodge, J. C. Thompson of New York paying \$2,100 for the youngster.

August 22nd to 26th will be Exhibition dates at Charlottetown. There will be three days racing, possibly a fourth. Popular classes, the usual gold pieces for drivers and groom, a gold piece for leading driver will be features as before.

The Provincial Exhibition, Charlottetown, will be the biggest in point of prize money distributed of any of the Agricultural fairs in the Maritimes this year. Saint John are not holding any live stock show and of course no racing. Halifax Exhibition in October will be somewhat on the lines of a winter fair. Charlottetown with its late summer dates should attract most of the Exhibition pleasure goers of the Maritimes this year.

Gene Sarazen Wins Golf Championship

NEW YORK, June 10.—(A.P.)—Gene Sarazen's record-smashing triumph in the British open golf championship today marked his first National open victory since he won the United States open, defeating Bobby Jones, in 1922 at Skokie, Chicago.

Sarazen was just 21 then, not long out of the ranks of the cadets in Westchester County, New York, where he got his start. He followed up by winning the National professional golfers' association championship. He successfully defended the P. G. A. title in 1923.

Since, although always a great "money player" and super finisher, championship heights had eluded Sarazen until today. Sarazen's victory abroad will make him the marked man and outstanding favorite in the United States open, to be played June 23-25, at the Fresh Meadow Club, Flushing, Long Island.

This was Sarazen's fourth bid for the British open in five years. He was runner-up to Walter Hagen in 1928, finished eighth in 1929 and was in tie for third, trailing Tommy Armour, last year.

ATHLETICS BACK IN THE PICTURE

Yesterday's Win Over Cleveland Places Them Again In First Division.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, June 10.—Alvin Crowder blanked the White Sox with three scattered hits today at Chicago as the Washington big guns rocked three pitchers for 4 and an easy 10 to 0 victory.

The big Washington inning was the eighth when the Senators clouted Thomas and Caraway for seven runs, including a home run with two on base by Bluege. The victory gave the Senators the series, three out of four. Sam Jones, who pitched seven innings, was charged with the defeat.

St. Louis at home made a clean sweep of a four-game series by defeating the Boston Red Sox 4 to 3. The victory brought the Browns' percentage to .500, John Michaels, a southpaw, held the Browns for six innings, but Kimzey relieved Hadley in the eighth for the Browns.

The Philadelphia Athletics bounced back into the first division of the American League at Cleveland as they scored four runs in the 10th inning to defeat Cleveland 10 to 7, but lost the services for three months of Ed Coleman, right fielder, who broke an ankle-bone sliding into the plate in the second inning.

Henry George Schuble, a Detroit bench warmer until a few days ago, wallowed two home runs against the New York Yankees at Detroit and made it three in two games, but his clouts were not enough to win. The Yankees came through in the 11th inning for an 8 to 7 triumph when Earle Combs doubled and Joe Sewell singled him home after two were out.

Lou Gehrig pisted his 13th home run to start fireworks in the first inning. Lefty Vernon Gomez, third Yankee pitcher, was credited with his eighth straight victory and his 11th of the season.

TENNIS

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 10. (A.P.)—Scoring an easy victory over Brazil's doubles pair on the new Red Court at Forest Hills today, the United States Davis cup team completed a two day conquest of the South Americans and cleared the final obstacle this side of the interzone finals at Paris July 23, 23 and 24.

Johnny Van Ryn and Wilmer Allison, United States doubles team, defeated Ricardo Fernandez and Ivo Simone, 6-1, 6-2, in a match that required only 40 minutes to play.

Today's triumph, following on the singles victories registered by Frank Shields and Allison yesterday, gave the United States team a string of 18 straight matches against Canada, Mexico, Australia and Brazil.

Allison and Van Ryn will have the opportunity to make it an even score tomorrow when they face Pernambuco and Simone, respectively. In the concluding singles hits, which cannot affect the outcome of the current series.

Shields was relieved of singles duty tomorrow for some reason or other, and Nelson Cruz, playing captain of the visitors, still was suffering from an arm injury received in yesterday's bout with Allison. He will be out at least a week.

The team play of Van Ryn and Allison today was close to perfection. It was the fourth game, in fact, before the South Americans contrived to win a point.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 10.—Great Britain fell behind today as the United States got a running start in the annual Wightman Cup tennis series among the women stars of the two countries.

Helen Wills Moody, United States and French singles champion, won in two straight sets from Mrs. Eileen Bennett Whittinghall, 6-2, 6-2, and Miss Helen Jacobs, California, called upon to play some of the finest tennis in her career, defeated Dorothy Round, 6-4, 6-3.

Italian Swimmer Enters Marathon

GENOA, Italy, June 10.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Giovanni Gambi the youthful Italian swimmer, embarked today on the Conte Grande for New York, enroute to Toronto where he plans to condition himself for the 15 mile Canadian National exhibition marathon next fall.

Gambi thrilled spectators at the exhibition last year by his unusual speed during the early part of the marathon. Although he failed to place in the marathon he won a consolation race later.

RECORD BREAKING

Ben Eastman, Stanford University's great middle-distance runner, bettered the world's record in both the 800 metres and the 880 yards at the annual Pacific Association championships at San Francisco recently. Two tapes were stretched across the track, one at 800 metres and one at the half mile mark. He was clocked at 1 minute, 50 seconds, flat for 800 metres, cutting by 6-10 of a second the world's record set by Sera Martin, of France, in 1922. For the half mile his time was 1:50.09. The record in this event is 1:51.06, held by Dr. Peltzer of Germany. Bob Keisel, University of California sprinter, tied the world's record of 20.4 seconds in the 100 metres. Ralph Montague, University of San Francisco, equalled the world's record in the 200-metres dash. He was timed in 20.6 seconds.
