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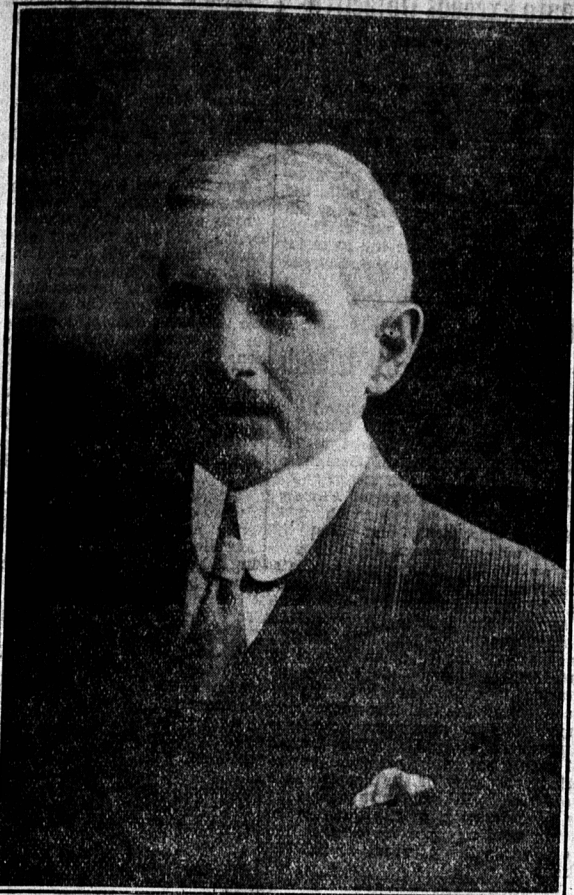

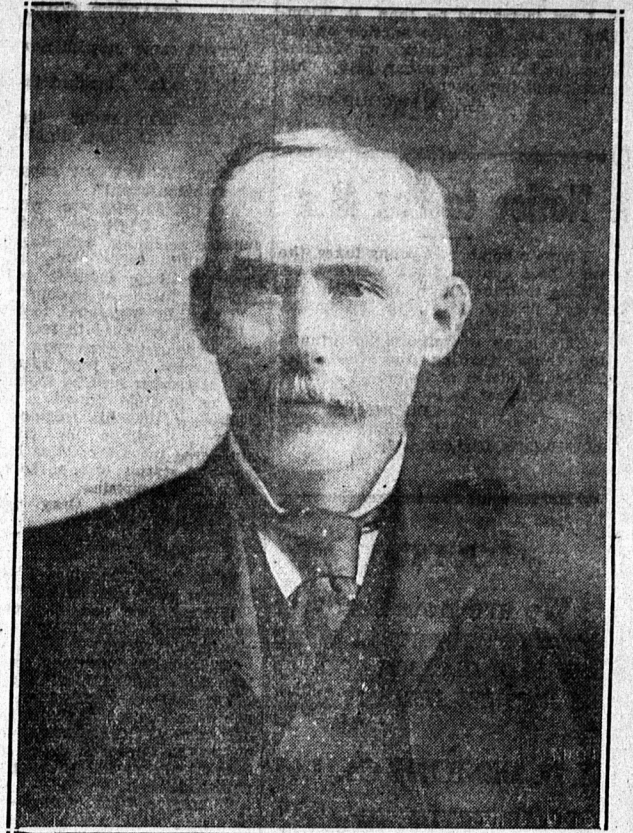

PARIS, Oct. 26.—Roumania has sent a proposal to Stephen Pichon, French Foreign Minister, suggesting the organization of Hungarian police so that the Rumanian troops may be withdrawn from Budapest, according to the Eclair.

Admiral Jellicoe Welcomed in Honolulu

HONOLULU, Oct. 26.—Admiral Sir John W. Jellicoe, commander of the British Grand fleet arrived here today aboard the warship New Zealand. He will leave for the mainland November 1st. Airplanes drop wreaths and flowers on the vessel as it came into the harbor. Admiral Jellicoe was made the guest of honor at a reception tendered him by naval and civic organizations.

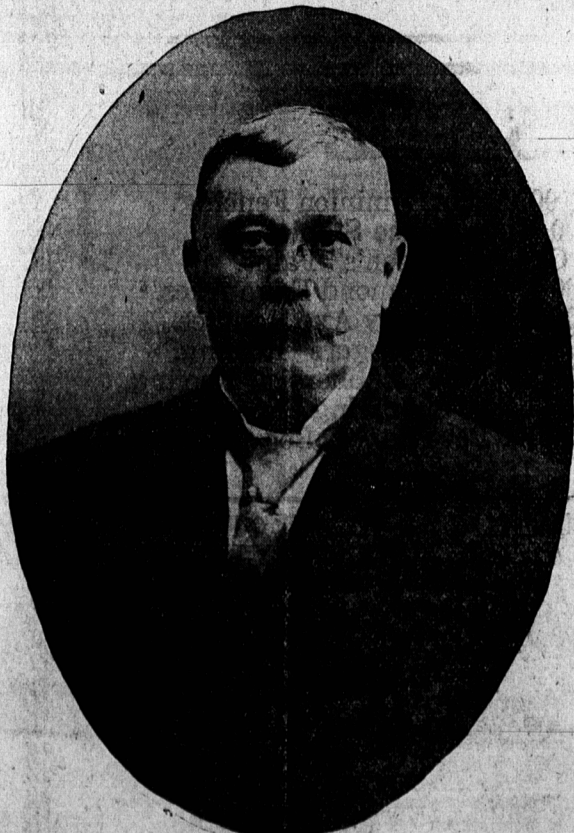

Gen. Mangin May Be Superseded

PARIS, Oct. 26.—The departure for the Baltic provinces of General Mangin, head of the mission which had been constituted to supervise the evacuation of the region by the German troops, now appears very improbable, the chances being that another man will be chosen to represent France. The Paris Intransigent said yesterday that difficulties had arisen of a political kind in connection with the dispatch of this mission which might play its departure or even jeopardize its existence.

Reports are reaching the peace conference that the Germans are pressing Riga and other points very hard and the situation as a whole is very disquieting to the allied representatives here.
