IT PAYS TO BUY in this Province
SCHOONER COMING—The schooner Alice Gertrude, which recently took a cargo of coal to Shelburne for Capt. John Hipson, has been purchased by Lemuel Clow and others, of Shelburne, and the register has been transferred from Lunenburg to this port. The Alice Gertrude was loaded with lumber by the Bruce Lumber Co., Ltd., of Cape Breton, and from there will proceed to P.E.I. for a load of produce for Shelburne says a Halifax exchange.

WITHOUT PARALLEL—An interesting fact has just occurred in this Province which is, it is understood, without parallel in the surgical annals of P. E. Island. One of the most prominent eye specialists of Charlottetown has just had under his treatment three men for the same disease. The peculiarity lies in the fact that the three men are brothers, that the disease was exactly the same in each case, cataract in the eye, that in each instance the same eye was affected, and that an operation was necessary on everyone. It is satisfactory to note that the operations were all successful. Medical scientists may no doubt be able to trace hereditary connection in these cases.

IMMIGRANT FARMERS—The first party of immigrant farmers from the Old Country for P. E. Island, in connection with Capt. Thomas's scheme, have arrived in the province. Accompanied by Capt. Thomas they arrived in Charlottetown by the express on Friday night. The party consisted of eleven immigrants, being composed of two farmers and their families, a farm labourer and a gardener with fifteen year's experience. These farmers have provisionally purchased farms on the Island, and with one of them Capt. Thomas left the city for Souris Saturday one of the farms on which an option of purchase has been secured. Originally, the party that came with Capt. Thomas from the home country included nine domestic servants, and they were intended for the island, but they were intercepted at Halifax, where they landed, by parties on the look out for servants there, and everyone without exception obtained situations in Nova Scotia's capital. A second party of immigrants which Capt. Thomas has got together is expected within the next few weeks.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT—A nine-year-old boy of Charlottetown, named Keoughan, met with rather a serious accident on Saturday afternoon, while riding a horse belonging to K. Gay, the meat dealer. The boy was riding the horse bareback, though he was using reins. He seems to have lost his hold on the reins through a sudden jolt of the animal, and the horse, finding its head free, began to canter. The boy grasped the main and held on to keep his seat. But the horse increased its speed, and when it was opposite the Morell House, the boy was unseated, and fell over the animal's head and between its hoofs. One of the tremendous blows caught him a nasty laceration on the head, inflicting a severe lacerated wound on the scalp. Several bystanders, who had witnessed the accident, promptly ran to the boy's assistance, picked him up and carried him across the street to Dr. Dorsey's where he received immediate attention and treatment.

SUIT FOR DAMAGES—The City Council it is understood intend to contest the claim for damages which has been made on behalf of Mrs. McEachern of this city, as the outcome of an injury she sustained through a fall on one of the city's concrete sidewalks. A writ has been filed against the Council for the recovery of damages to the extent of \$800. The Council on the opinion of its legal adviser refutes the liability alleged against it.
