VISCOUNT MILTON'S BIG CHRISTENING

LONDON, Feb. 25—The christening of the infant Viscount Milton, heir to the substantial fortune of Wentworth Woodhouse, was celebrated on Saturday at the great residence which characterized the golden wedding anniversary of the late Earl and Countess.

A great village of some 2000 people surrounded the great house, which is the country seat of Lord Fitzwilliam, and in this gigantic marquee more than three thousand persons enjoyed the hospitalities extended in honor of the first direct heir to the earldom in seventy-five years.

Seven hundred persons were invited to the christening, but only a limited number was able to see the actual ceremony, which was performed in the church adjacent to the castle. The church looked like a field of flowers, and it was with palms, lilies, white azaleas and hydrangeas.

The baptismal bowl, a valuable possession of the Fitzwilliams, was of silver, oval in shape, exquisitely wrought, and bore inscriptions of the infant's name.

After the ceremony, which was conducted by the Rev. R. E. W. Veriol, the guests assembled in front of the castle and were all presented to the head of the house. Four bands furnished music, and there was an immense display of daylight fireworks. The refreshments were served to the guests in the marquee on the lawn, and there was a barbecue for the tenants and other visitors.

Several prime bullocks, products of the estate, were roasted, and this was a feature of great importance. According to an English newspaper, there were 20,000 sandwiches, 20,000 meat patties, 2,000 gallons of beer and unlimited quantities of tea, without which no English function would be complete. A special staff of 300 waiters, who went from London to Wentworth by special train, served this gigantic feast.

The little Viscount received many handsome presents, including enough silver mugs to fill a cupboard, but the gift the Earl appreciated most was a great silver bowl from the employees of the estate. No such christening had ever taken place in England, as there were more than 40,000 persons in attendance at guests or lookers on. The returning reminded one of the feudal days when all those who lived in a barony were retainers.

CASE OF "HARRIET" IS ONE OF PATHOS

LONDON, Feb. 25—As stated last week, "Harriet Churchill," the "Harriet" who offered to buy so many men family retainers and who is actually Miss Christa, a Steadman, Hays Hall, Pillongley, Warwickshire, suffered a mental breakdown and is now in a private nursing home.

Miss Steadman, who is forty years old, is a member of one of the best known families of the yeoman class in Warwickshire. Her father, Joseph Steadman, in discussing her case, said it came as a great surprise to him and his family when they heard that Christina was written under the name of "Harriet Churchill."

"Three or four years ago," says Mr. Steadman, "Christina was in London. She worked for several newspapers there, was a member of the 'Writers' Club' and met many prominent politicians and public men. I suspect that the American newspapers first suggested to her that she should obtain the sort of information that she was trying to get as 'Harriet.'"

Mr. Steadman admitted that he had no evidence to sustain the charge against American newspapers, but he has evidently imbibed the prejudice created by the unwise comments of the English press which with characteristic generosity, said died "Harriet" upon America when her methods of obtaining taciturns scandal were exposed. In this connection it will be remembered that "Harriet" when interviewed several weeks ago by a Daily Mail reporter, said she never had furnished any news or scandal to American newspapers.

"What induced your daughter to adopt the name of Harriet Churchill?" Mr. Steadman was asked.

"I can't say," he replied. "As a matter of fact, we didn't know she was writing under that name until recently. She always had a great deal of correspondence. We found barrels full of letters in her room after she was removed."

The family had not told Miss Steadman's gradual breaking down to her until after the trial. The English press began to search for her, her condition became so serious that the doctors decided that for her own safety as well as that of her family she must go away.

TWO SUICIDES CAUSED BY A CLAUSE IN WILL

WICHITA, Kan., Feb. 21—The will of David S. Haines, a wealthy farmer, man of Rose Hill, has resulted in two deaths. Haines is cited in it that his daughter, Katherine Haines, should not share in his \$1,000,000 estate if she married before she was twenty-five. William McQuitty, a young man of this city, married to whom it was rumored she was engaged.

Miss Haines killed herself last Monday because of this clause. She was eighteen years old.

This morning McQuitty took his life by shooting himself with a shotgun. He had been depressed since the death of Miss Haines, and friends and relatives feared that he was preparing to take his life.

He took his shotgun this morning and went into the field in the rear of the barn in the McQuitty farm, saying he was going hunting.

TORONTO WATER SERVICE BROKEN

TORONTO, Feb. 24—The break in Toronto's water pipe has been found. At noon today the city's divers discovered a break in the top of a pipe 600 feet out from the island shore. Sand had drifted into the pipe until it was almost completely blocked up.

The city is using lacoon water almost entirely at present, and will continue until the intake pipe is repaired.

"Work night and day at it," says the mayor's assistants to the city engineer, explaining the break. "The pipe was almost filled with sand, and very little lake water could get through. We will have to take up 750 feet of pipe, and carry it over to the city to be repaired."

It will be perhaps weeks before the broken pipe can be removed, repaired and replaced.
