of life about me after the crash. The time of the crash was fixed at 2:40 A.M. by Mrs. Paul Warrick, who checked her clock as her husband rushed out to see what had caused an explosion. She called the Galax fire department.

Its rescue squad, arriving in 20 minutes, pulled 18 charred bodies from the burning plane in an hour and a half after extinguishing the flames with chemicals and water.

The plane, a DC3, was due in Miami at 2:23 A.M. A.S.T. and radioed its position at 2:14 A.M. as a "fifteen more than five miles south-east of the field and 7,000 feet up."

The emphasis on the human element is no sentimental theory. It comes from more men than women from the large cities than the rural areas; it is the practical judgment of a high proportion of white collar workers and of more of the business and professional class themselves than any other group.

Typical statements are: "Management is too distant;" "should take employees into confidence, discuss plans, get employees' opinions;" "There is not enough effort to balance seasonal employment;" "too many old men at the head; lack of interest in the nation's welfare;" "Jobs go to relatives; favoritism; pull; too hard for a good man to work his way up;" "managers do not fraternize with the working man; drive men to strike; have poor and insufficient personnel systems, health, pensions, etc.;" "worker just a machine."

Even in comments relating to wage rates, the usual expressions are "poor pay and conditions," "driving the workers too hard," "more interest in the stockholders than the workers." Only 4 per cent of those expressing criticism made specific reference to labor union relations. In no case was management charged with seeking to kill the unions. The usual comment of this group ran: "should not resent unions - - - be more co-operative and conciliatory - - - should foresee and forestall strikes."

CRITICISM OF INDUSTRIAL MANAGEMENT ON HUMAN FACTORS AS MUCH AS PAY RATES

Impersonal Attitude Top Fault of Bosses Public Poll Finds

TORONTO, Jan. 4. - The faults of industrial management, as seen by Canadian voters, relate to lack of human understanding more than to lack of generosity in pay to the workers.

Money a good wage, is important, but what is as basic, if not more so, is personal interest in the individual employee, his opinions, his hopes and his home conditions.

This is the criticism and the challenge to industrial leaders and employers voiced by Canadians in all walks of life in the latest Gallup poll, on the question:

"If you were asked to criticize the management of industry, what would your MAIN criticism be?"
