Blow Out, You Bugles Over The Rich Dead!

GOING BACK to the sources of our race, to the Elizabethan tradition, if you will, Sir Henry Newbolt wrote:

"O race of tireless fighters, flushed with a youth renewed, Right well the wars of freedom bent the sea-king's brood. Long-suffering were the sea-kings, they were not swift to kill; But when the sands had fallen they waited no man's will; Though all the world forbade them, they counted not nor cared; They weighed not help or hindrance; they did the thing they cared."

Six words that tell the story of the British race: They did the thing they dared. And read what Kathleen Simmonds wrote some months ago in the "Daily Telegraph" of London, England:

"Sir Richard Grenville calling in the fading sunset light, In the harbour where the good ships go; 'Ho, my masters, make ye ready to acclaim the gallant fight Of a little ship against a mighty foe! Call him on the deep sea, with a convoy in her keep - (O ye bravest in this harbour, give her room!) See, the shepherd flings her life away to save her scattered sheep As she steams to meet the raider - and her doom.'

So they waited in the harbour till at last the firing died, And the flames had ceased to leap across the sea. Then a battered ship came limping, blackened, weary, full of pride, Home to anchor in the haven of the free.

As long as tides flow, and winds whip the spume from the running sea, so long will British seafarers carry on the tradition that sent Captain Fagan and his crew to their proud doom and "the haven of the free." And always there will be leadership to match this native gallantry of soul. Because:

"Drake, he's in his hammock till the great Armadas come, (Captain, art thou sleeping there below?) 'Sung' atween the round shot, an' listen! for the drum, An' dreamin' art the time o' Plymouth Hoe, Call him on the deep sea, with a convoy in the sound, Call him when ye sail to meet the foe, Where the old trade's plyin' an' the old flag flyin' They shall find him ware an' wakin' as they found him long ago."

Remember Jane Marryot's toast towards the close of Noel Coward's Cavalcade?

"Now, then, let's couple the future of England with the past of England. The glories and victories and triumphs that are over, and the sorrows that are over, too. Let's drink to our sons, who made part of the pattern, and to our hearts that died with them. Let's drink to the spirit of gallantry and courage that made a strange Heaven out of unbelievable Hell. And let's drink to the hope that one day this country of ours, which we love so much, will find dignity and greatness and peace again."

Dignity and greatness and peace again? The hope that is in our hearts for this country of ours? That does not rest with us, men of the pen and men of affairs. That future lies with our sons.

"Blow out, you bugles, over the rich dead! There's none of these so lonely and poor of old, But, dying, has made us rarer gifts than gold. These laid the world away; poured out the red Sweet wine of youth; gave up the years to be Of work and joy, and that unhoped serene That men call age; and those who would have been, Their sons, they gave - their immortality."

Blow, bugles, blow! They brought us for our dearth Holiness, lacked so long, and Love and Pain. Honour has come back, as a king, to earth, And paid his subjects with a royal wage to be Of work and joy, and that unhoped serene That men call age; and those who would have been, Their sons, they gave - their immortality."

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WHEN BOMBS BURST

-In Britain, when they blast Germany's invasion ports and hammer at Berlin, The Canadian Press brings the story to its member newspaper readers through an eight-man staff living and working in the heart of war-torn London.

Through their personal experiences, through the eyes of returning R.A.F. bomber pilots, and with the aid of reports of The CP's great ally, The Associated Press, these young Canadians paint for their countrymen a daily picture of the havoc that war is bringing to Europe and the heroism of a nation "on guard and in the line."

Bombed from their homes and their office, they have carried on a service since the war's start that was not halted even when The CP London office was destroyed by fire last Dec. 29. Here you meet three of them.



D. E. BURRITT, Who heard bombs thud and Nazi planes roar overhead he lay helpless in a London hospital. Recovered, he was bounced out of bed a few days later when bombs damaged his London apartment. A veteran at 33, Burritt has been with CP 17 years, has worked in half a dozen Canadian cities.



LOUIS V. HUNTER, recently returned to London after spending two weeks aboard a Canadian destroyer to write of the part Canadian sailors are playing in the Battle of the Atlantic. Hunter, 27, has had several narrow escapes in bombing raids, one when he was caught in the third-floor CP office as bombs straddled the building.



DOUGLAS AMARON, Who will move into action as an additional War Correspondent with the Canadian Corps should Hitler invade England. Amaron, 26, arrived in England as the Nazi bombing attacks were beginning last summer, has visited several hard-hit British cities to survey the damage and cable factual reports.

These and five other Canadians - Sam Robertson, Harold Fair, Pat Usher, Ross Munro and Foster Barclay - combine their efforts to bring CP member newspapers in Canada a vivid, accurate report of life in Britain today.
